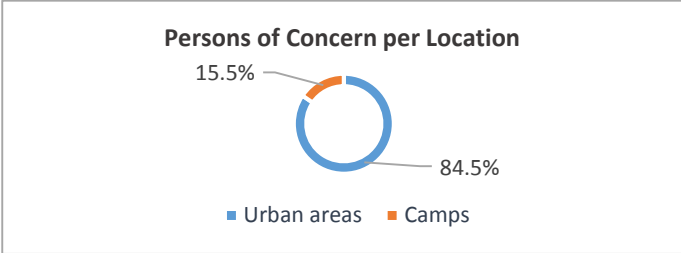




In cooperation with the Government of Jordan and partners, UNHCR Jordan ensures that every refugee, whether living in camp or urban area, is properly registered and documented, have access protection and legal assistance, shelter, core relief items, potable water, food, health care, education and psychosocial support, and is given the opportunity to rebuilt his/her life in safety and dignity.

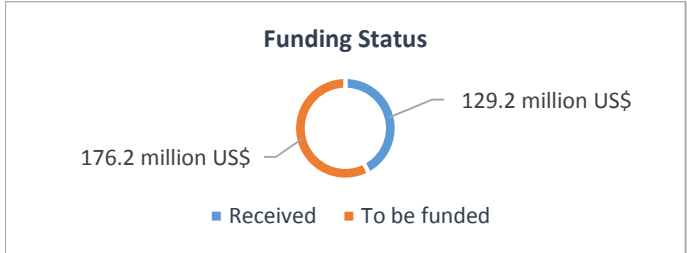
Population of Concern Registered

Total population of concern – **638,383** persons, including **605,157** Syrians, **28,809** Iraqi refugees and **4,417** refugees of other nationalities.



UNHCR Jordan Funding Needs

Total funding needs – **305.4 million US\$**, including **273.9 million US\$** for the Syrian refugee response and **31.5 million US\$** for operations related to Iraqis and refugees of other nationalities.

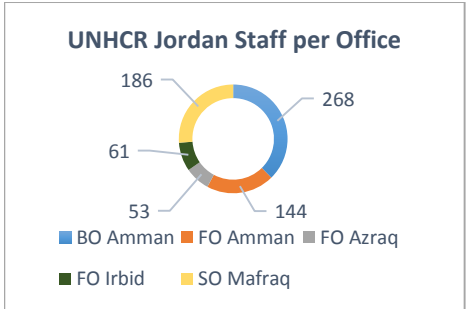


UNHCR Presence in Jordan

UNHCR Jordan Staff – **712** persons, including **140** internationals, **560** nationals and 12 interns.

UNHCR Jordan Structure – One branch office (BO) and three field/sub offices (F/SO): **BO Amman**, **FO Amman**, **FO Azraq** (covering Emirati Jordanian and Azraq camps), **FO Irbid** (covering King Abdullah Park and Cyber City) and **SO Mafraq** (covering Raba Sarhan registration centre and Zaatari camp).

UNHCR Jordan also operates a **help-line**, 8h/5 days, to answer questions and petitions from refugees. Help-line receives an average of 2,500 calls per day.

Focus on the Syrian Refugee Response

Out of the 605,157 Syrians registered with UNHCR, 506,222 are living in host communities and 98,935 in the camps of Zaatari, Emirati Jordanian and Azraq camps. All services in camps are free of charge. In urban areas, refugees can seek UNHCR assistance through:

- Home visits: since 2011, UNHCR and IRD have undertaken more than 140,000 home visits for vulnerable Syrians to assess their situation and ensure the follow-up of previous assistance and protection intervention.
- Help desks: refugees outside Amman can seek assistance in permanent help desks (Amman, Irbid and Mafraq) and mobile help desk organized in other governorates.
- Mobile registration and renewal which are organized for extremely vulnerable refugees in remote locations.
- Vulnerable refugees are also eligible for monthly financial assistance. In June, UNHCR cash assistance programme reached more than 20,000 families (80,000 individuals).
