

Significant progress has been made in 2016 to provide protection and assistance to over 4.8 million Syrian refugees along with host communities in Turkey, Lebanon, Jordan, Iraq and Egypt under the 3RP's coordinated, region-wide response to the Syria crisis.

The refugee response under the 3RP is coordinated by UNHCR, and the resilience response by UNDP. The 3RP involves more than 200 partners, including Governments, United Nations agencies, NGOs and other international and national actors.

3RP KEY MESSAGES FROM THE MID-YEAR REPORT

- **Continued Need for International Protection:** 3RP partners call for the protection of civilians in Syria and the delivery of humanitarian assistance in line with international humanitarian law as well as their admission to safety in the neighbouring countries.
- **Vulnerabilities on the Increase:** In some countries, refugees face difficulties in accessing services, impacting their ability to provide food, housing, health and trauma care, and other basic needs for their families. They are increasingly exhausting their savings and resources and are falling further into poverty.
- **Host Governments Continue to Bear the Burden:** 3RP partners call upon the international community to support neighbouring States who are providing an enormous global good and bearing the financial and social costs of the refugee crisis.
- **Access to Livelihoods Increasing, but more Support Needed:** Progress since the London Conference of February 2016 has been made by the governments of Turkey, Lebanon and Jordan on the Compact commitments in the areas of education and livelihoods. Such progress on policy and regulation change by the host countries needs to be matched by reinvigorated funding and other international support.
- **Funding Not Keeping up with Needs:** The London Conference overall raised USD 11.22 billion in pledges for the Syria crisis, including multi-year funding from 2016 - 2020. Unfortunately, the disbursement of these generous pledges to 3RP partners has been slow, with only USD 1.38 billion (30 per cent of the 3RP inter-agency requirements for 2016) actually received as of 31 May 2016. It is now vital that all pledges are disbursed as soon as possible so that the negative impacts of underfunding on refugees and host community members can be alleviated.
- **Underfunding Impacts Delivery of Assistance:** While some sectors are relatively better funded than others, underfunding is undermining the ability of 3RP programming to mitigate further impoverishment of refugees and host communities and to stem the protection risks associated with increasing poverty.

Protection

91% of Syrian refugees (above 7 years old) with updated registration records including iris scan enrolment
355,899 girls and boys participated in structured, sustained child protection or PSS programmes

2,035,767 individuals received food assistance (cash, voucher or in-kind)
2,454 individuals received food & agricultural livelihoods support

694,805 targeted children (5-17) enrolled in formal education (primary or secondary)
65 educational facilities constructed, renovated or rehabilitated

1,090,795 primary health care consultations provided to target individuals

102,853 households received unconditional, sector-specific or emergency cash assistance







EXAMPLES OF CONSEQUENCES OF UNDERFUNDING



PROTECTION

- Protection partners will not be able to meet their targets for identifying and providing services to vulnerable refugees, including in relation to child protection, prevention of and response to SGBV, and psycho-social services (PSS) for survivors of violence and those at risk.



FOOD SECURITY

- While generous pledges have seen food assistance levels restored in 2016 in anticipation of funds being received, it is vital that pledges are confirmed to ensure that critical food assistance is sustained.



EDUCATION

- As of April 2016, there were more than 916,000 (or 56 per cent of) school-age Syrian children out-of-school across the region: a nine percentage point increase in the rate of out-of-school children compared to December 2015.



HEALTH & NUTRITION

- In total across the region, without full funding through to the end of the year, at least 10,500 families will not access secondary and tertiary health care.



BASIC NEEDS

- In total across the region, without full funding to the end of the year, at least 179,000 families will not receive monthly and seasonal cash assistance, while 270,000 families will not receive regular and seasonal Core Relief Items.



SHELTER

- In total across the region, without full funding through to the end of the year, at least 35,000 families will not be provided with shelters, shelter kits and maintenance for those living in the most insecure dwellings.



WASH

- Across the region, areas such as distribution networks and systems for safe final treatment of waste water are in severe need of rehabilitation.



LIVELIHOODS

- Across the region, activities to localize resilience will be compromised, including investment in sustainable livelihoods, job creation targets and support to local and national knowledge, capacities and resources.
