



HIGHLIGHTS

- During the reporting period a total of 802 South Sudanese new arrivals were registered by the government and UNHCR, bringing the total number of newly registered South Sudanese refugees during the month of October on 1,665 individuals. In addition, a total of 1,303 new arrivals remained in the transit centre pending registration.
- Relocation of the group of approximately 13,000 non-Somali refugees from Dadaab to Kalobeyei has started.
- 1662 refugees were assisted to return to Somalia during the month of October 2016. 34,321 individuals have been supported to return to Somalia since the beginning of the process in December 2014, out of which 28,220 have returned in 2016.
- During the UN Staff Day, UNHCR's nominee Ambassador Tegla Loroupe was awarded as the 2016 UN Person of the Year for her work in mentoring refugee athletes in Kenya.

MAIN ACTIVITIES



Registration and Refugees Status Determination (RSD)

- The RSD schedule currently runs until 1 September 2019.
- The Refugee Affairs Secretariat (RAS) resumed its predecessor DRA's Technical Advisory Committee duties which will allow for recognition of asylum seekers as refugees under the Government of Kenya and issuance of Alien IDs.
- 16,578 new arrivals in Kakuma have been registered in 2016 including 2,099 in October.
- 3,448 new-borns have been registered in Kakuma 2016 including 331 in October.
- 166 new born were registered during this period, 11 of whom were assigned in-situ birth status in Dadaab.

Protection Monitoring

The operation continues to conduct regular missions to the Nadapal border for the purpose of protection monitoring and pick-up of new arrivals. Refugees report that they fled their country because of clashes causing scarcity of food, lack of health and other social services. Many schools remain closed leading to lack of education facilities.

Child Protection

- Kakuma had a total of 11973 separated children (SC) and 2314 unaccompanied minors (UAMs).
- A new system for tracking BID requests by RSD was implemented with the support of the RSD, RST and CP teams.

SGBV

UNHCR together with partner staff participated in the SGBV training facilitated by the Regional support Centre. The team identified 2 best practices from the region that can be introduced to the Kenya Programme to improve on SGBV prevention and response strategies.

Statelessness

- The Makonde community of stateless persons living in Kenya met with the President who issued a directive to issue the Makonde with Kenyan citizenship and identity documentation.
- UNHCR while working together with the Department of Immigration, the National Registration Bureau, Civil Registration Services and the Citizenship Advisory Committee, a registration schedule was established for the registration of the Makonde in Kwale.

Community Empowerment and Self-Reliance

- Ksh 579,697 sales were made by refugees through trade fairs and through the Pamoja Collective Facebook page.
- The POCs engaged in the Artists for Refugees program have advanced to production phase. A total of 7 audio tracks have been recorded by refugee artists.
- Sports equipment was issued to 40 refugee athletes and six sports officials in Kambioos and Ifo 1 camps. This was aimed at motivating refugee athletes to develop their skills by using "Sports and sport values education as a means to promote

- and enhance protection of human rights of refugees and asylum seekers" for peaceful coexistence and social development.
- Phase 2 of the Artists for Refugees program focusing on actual production and recording of music started. The trained refugee artists will showcase during a gala planned from 28th November 3rd December 2016 in Nairobi.

Education

- CEO of Safaricom Limited, Bob Collymore held a Leadership Video Conference session with refugee students from Dadaab and Kakuma.
- UNHCR in collaboration with UNICEF jointly conducted an EMIS data management training targeting education officers, including heads of schools. The training provided orientation to new staff on EMIS, defined the scope of education data collected, provided indicators for education planning and evaluation on data collection procedures.
- Data collection for urban refugees enrolled in private and non-formal centers was conducted. Initial data shows that a total of 5529 (2665 M, 2874 F) are enrolled.

Health

- Increasing trend of suspected Varicella (Chicken Pox) cases was noted. This started with sporadic cases from Dagahaley and later other camps also reported increasing trend. Health partners heighten the surveillance and case management.
- There has been a decrease in cases of moderate and severe malnutrition among children under five years in Kakuma. Interventions to reverse malnutrition rates witnessed during the last quarter included: recruitment of additional qualified staff for nutrition programme, in the transit center and reception center to improve on screening of children under 5; increase in number of nurses to have 24 hour coverage at the stabilization center and community mobilization in most affected communities on the importance of early signs of malnutrition.
- UNHCR in collaboration with Kenya Red Cross (KRCS) conducted five day Integrated Management of Acute Malnutrition (IMAM) training for 25 Health Workers across all the camps, the training was facilitated by ToT trainers from Ministry of Health.
- 200 patients were supported by UNHCR through the Kenya Association for the Welfare of people with Epilepsy (KAWE). In addition, KAWE facilitated a training on clinical management of epilepsy for health professionals working in the Dadaab refugee camps. 68 individuals were reviewed by obstetrics and gynaecology consultants who visited Dadaab.

Food Security and Nutrition

• The general food distribution for the month of October was completed successfully across all the five Dadaab camps with no major incident reported.

Water and Sanitation

- UNHCR supplied 31.2 litters of water per day per capita from 29 boreholes to the entire refugee population in the five Dadaab camps. 26 of these boreholes operate on Solar PV Diesel hybrid system. The water supply schemes convey water to 48 tanks with a total storage capacity of 6,250m3, from where the water distributed to refugees through 900 tap stands scattered around the five camps.
- UNHCR collaboration with Norwegian Refugee Council (NRC) constructed 260 household latrines in Hagadera (169) and Hagadera outskirts (91) Ifo 2 (270) through. The current latrine cover is 81% up from 63% in June, 2016 for a about 52,275hh.

Shelter & NFIs

• The construction of new transit centres at Hagadera, Ifo and Dagahaley camps have started, the work is implemented through Peace Winds Japan (PWJ). Each transit centre is planned to accommodate 2,000 persons.

Durable Solutions

Voluntary Return

• Owing to the suspension of reception of road convoys by the Jubaland administration, the operation began facilitating return to Baidoa by flights. Two flights will transport returnees every Monday and Wednesday until further notice.

- The voluntary repatriation of Somali refugees continues in Kakuma. The total number of returnees from Kakuma currently stands at 381 individuals. A group of leaders from Kakuma will conduct a go and see visit to Mogadishu and Kismayo together with leaders from Dadaab and Nairobi.
- Volrep sensitization forums were held in various towns where urban refugees reside i.e. Nakuru, Eldoret, Kitale, Bungoma and Malaba. Somali refugees were sensitized on the voluntary repatriation process and the voluntariness of the process and areas of return.

Resettlement

• A total of 160 cases totalling 530 individuals were referred from Dadaab, Kakuma and Nairobi and submitted to the U.S.A., Canada, Australia, Sweden and the UK for resettlement consideration.
