


Registered refugees and asylum-seekers

HIGHLIGHTS

- Repatriation Road convoys were suspended from the 30th August, after the Jubaland administration notified UNHCR
 Somalia about their decision not to receive any more returnees until issues they have regarding the reintegration inside
 Somalia are addressed. This happened when at total of 2048 refugees were mobilized to Hagadera and Dagahaley camps
 transit centres in readiness for departure. Following discussions with Jubaland administration this category of refugees
 travelled on the 29 September 2016.
- Road convoys to Somalia still remain suspended. Similarly, the flight departures to Mogadishu were suspended on the 25 September because of security related issues in Mogadishu.

Working with Partners

- UNHCR and UNICEF Kenya/Somalia held a meeting in Nairobi titled "Strengthening Child Protection Interventions during Voluntary Repatriation Process". Save the Children, Terres Des Hommes (TdH), Danish Refugee Council (DRC), and INTERSOS were represented in the meeting an effort to explore and agree on modalities for strengthening child protection responses during voluntary repatriation and ensuring a comprehensive mechanism for supporting children throughout the process of refugees' voluntary repatriation.
- A consultative meeting between UNHCR, Heshima Kenya and the Refugee Affairs Secretariat (RAS) was held to form network and partnership, and better understand the role of RAS in registration process for UASC and issuance of Minors Pass.
- UNHCR in collaboration with Save the Children International conducted training on Refugee Law and International Protection for 27 Police Officers drawn from various police stations working in Dadaab camps.
- 13 health workers based in Garissa were trained on how to fill P3 forms (medical form for SGBV cases filled by health partners) to enhance partners' capacity with regards to response to Gender Based Violence.
- UNHCR and its partners continue to monitor the protection space of persons of concers (PoC). A total of 15 police stations in urban centres were visited by RCK and Kituo Cha Sheria, and court interventions made for 91 PoC to secure their release.

MAIN ACTIVITIES



Registration and Refugees Status Determination (RSD)

- The RSD taskforce was restarted with the Refugee Affairs Secretariat (RAS) head of protection and RAS RSD supervisor.
 The RSD transition discussed staffing, case processing procedures, training plans and performance indicators for RAS staff.
- Post population fixing exercise in Dadaab, 643 no-show were re-activated.

Child Protection

- 1,024 (817 male and 207 female) South Sudanese Unaccompanied Minors (UAMs) have been registered since December 2013 influx bringing the cumulative number of registered UAMs in Kakuma to 2,267.
- 6,297 (4,019 male and 2,278 female) South Sudanese separated children (SC) have been registered since December 2013 influx bringing the cumulative number of registered SC in Kakuma to 11,616.

SGBV and Persons with Specific Needs (PSN)

- 7 PSN families of 25 persons were identified in urban areas.
- 20 cases of SGBV in Kakuma were reported and assisted to access specialized services including psychosocial counseling and medical treatment to address immediate needs.

Statelessness

• UNHCR and a group of Non-Governmental Organisations jointly reviewed existing nationality legislation in the country with the aim to consolidate and proposed amendments in a meeting with Members of Parliament. The meeting, which will be attended by relevant legal committees and representatives from the government will audit the proposed amendments and agree on amendments to be tabled in parliament.



Community Empowerment and Self-Reliance

- 514 (225M&289F) persons of concern were profiled at the reception centre and in the community to facilitate matching their skills with existing livelihoods opportunities hence building into the asset-based approach to livelihoods programming.
- 28 groups were identified for the livestock value chain activity. DRC will continue to engage the groups to refine the proposed activities before commencement of the project.
- 33 village savings and loans groups in Dadaab continue to progress in their savings and loans activities. During the period, their cumulative financial portfolio was recorded with a total savings of Ksh 518,600, Ksh 242,000 loans disbursed and Ksh 53,680 social fund.
- Ksh 59,000 worth of products were sold through the Pamoja Collectives site during the month. Ksh 524,597 sales have been made by refugees through trade fairs and the social media site.
- 15 out of 63 the PoCs in urban areas enrolled in certified vocational courses have completed the course. 20 PoCs who undertook short bespoke courses, received start-up support; 3 have started generating income.

Education

- The enrolment in Kalobeyei Settlement temporary primary school increased slightly from 1219 to 1533 (970 boys 563 females) children. The attendance rate was 76.4% for boys and 77.8% for girls. Enrollment in the temporary pre-school was 607 (331 boys, 275 girls) children. Construction of permanent school infrastructure is ongoing.
- School enrolment in Kakuma camp current estimate figure stands at 74,754 (44,116 boys 30,638 girls).
- Ministry of Education Science and Technology (MoEST) Quality Assurance and Standards team conducted inspection and
 assessment in all refugee Early Child Development, Primary, Secondary and Alternative Learning Programme (ALP)
 centers in Dadaab. A comprehensive individual school report will be shared with UNHCR education unit for partner
 agencies to work on the technical recommendations given by the MoEST team.
- A mass information campaign was conducted in Kambioos to encourage pupils to attend school. This was necessitated
 by poor attendance due to loss of huge number of children to ongoing voluntarily repatriation which demoralized
 remaining pupils and moreover is also anticipated to affect Kenya Certificate for Primary Education performance this
 year.



Health

• Preliminary results of the annual nutrition survey released during the reporting month show an increase in both anaemia across all Dadaab camps.



Food Security and Nutrition

- 64,623 households of 277,008 individuals are projected to benefit from food distribution in all locations in the five camps in the month of October 2016.
- Complementary food was provided to 4472 pregnant and lactating women in Kakuma in the first supplementary feeding cycle of the month. A ration of 2.5kgs of green grams per beneficiary was distributed.
- Community management of acute malnutrition programme was implemented and monitored with 1,827 new admissions into the programme in Kakuma.
- Nutritional screening for children under five years and pregnant and lactating women is on-going at Nadapal Transit centre.



Water and Sanitation

- Installation of emergency WASH facilities continued in Kalobeyei. These included plastic water tanks, tap stands and construction of communal pit latrines.
- Permanent WASH infrastructure installation continues in Kalobeyei. Installation of three elevated steel tanks in Cluster 1 and survey and designing of the pipeline from Tarach to Kalobeyei was initiated.
- 34 litters of water per day per capita from 29 boreholes to the entire refugee population in the five Dadaab camps. 26 of these boreholes operate on Solar PV Diesel hybrid system. The water supply schemes convey water to 48 tanks with a total storage capacity of 6,250m3, from where the water distributed to refugees through 900 tap stands scattered around the five camps.
- 15 boreholes were operated across Kakuma camp providing water. The average per capita water supply was 22.47L/P/D.
- 5 boreholes in Kakuma were solarized and operationalized.



• 216 Solar Street Lights have been installed under the IKEA Brighter Lives for Refugees Program in both Kakuma and Kalobeyei.

Durable Solutions

Voluntary Return

- During the reporting period, 2,525 returnees were supported to voluntarily return to Somalia by flight and road convoys. In total, as of 30th September, 32,949 Somali refugees had returned home since 8th December 2014, when UNHCR started supporting voluntary return of Somali refugees in Kenya, out of which 26,848 were supported in 2016 alone.
- A total 26,819 active refugees have in principle confirmed their intention to voluntary return to Somalia and waiting to be facilitated to return to Somalia.

Resettlement

• A total of 315 cases totalling 847 individuals were referred from Dadaab, Kakuma and Nairobi and submitted to the U.S.A, Canada and Australia for resettlement consideration.
