







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




Trends of POCs Approaching the Return Help Desk between May 2015 and August 2016





From the launch of Return Help Desk in all Dadaab's camps at the end of November 2013; 42,528 PoCs were interviewed and 42,273 among them have expressed their intention to repatriate to Somalia. 22,301 Individuals have been repatriated to Somalia as of 12th August 2016. 2,467 have been inactivated in proGres database for No-show or spontaneous departure. While 17,505 refugees willing to return (in principle) remain active.

Despite the relatively high number of refugees who have indicated their willingness to return, some have changed their mind which has impacted the voluntary repatriation plans. It is also worth noting that in the absence of finalized plan (which is almost done) for the assistance to returnees going to areas beyond the 9 opened for returns, it has not been possible to facilitate the return of refugees going to those areas. This has generated complaints from refugees and may have justified some spontaneous departures.
