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The Supreme Court found that Myanmar citizens who acquire citizenship automatically under the 1948 Citizenship Act, section 4(2), are not bound to produce a UCC issued under section 6(2) of the Act in order to prove their citizenship. Indeed, the Court held that "[t]here seems to be considerable confusion in the minds of some magistrates regarding the certificates granted under s.6(2) of the Union Citizenship Act, to persons who are deemed to be citizens under s.4(2) thereof. It is not incumbent on a person claiming to be a citizen under s. 4(2) to ask for the issue of such a citizenship certificate. If he can prove that he comes under s. 4(2) in any proceeding against him, he is not bound to produce the certificate under s.6(2)."
