UNHCR'S Facilitated Voluntary Repatriation

IF YOU ARE A SRI LANKAN REFUGEE WHO WANTS TO RETURN HOME.

UNHCR CAN HELP YOU!

Every year, UNHCR helps hundreds of thousands of refugees and asylum-seekers to voluntarily return to their home countries around the world. If you are thinking about returning to Sri Lanka, UNHCR can provide you with information and counseling to help you decide whether and when to return. If you decide to return, UNHCR can help you with international travel, exit and entry requirements, documentation, reintegration grants and post-return monitoring.

IF YOU ARE THINKING ABOUT RETURNING TO SRI LANKA

- Contact your family members and friends where you intend returning to in Sri Lanka by telephone, letter or email and ask what the current conditions are in that area.
- Speak to UNHCR officials in the country where you are a refugee or an asylum-seeker. UNHCR staff will give you information to help you make an informed decision about whether and when to return. (See addresses of UNHCR offices at the end of this brochure.)

ONCE YOU DECIDE TO RETURN, BUT BEFORE YOU DEPART FROM YOUR COUNTRY OF ASYLUM

- You should register the birth of any children who were born outside Sri Lanka with the Sri Lankan Consular Office in your country of asylum.
- Collect all your family and individual identity documents and guard them carefully. Make sure you take them with you to Sri Lanka in the UNHCR bag provided.

These documents include:

Passports, Birth Certificates, Birth Registrations, Sri Lankan National Identity Cards, Land documents, educational Diplomas and Certificates from primary & secondary schools, vocational and university courses and medical documents.

- UNHCR staff in the country of asylum will help you to fill out a Voluntary Repatriation Form (VRF). You must keep this form safely in the UNHCR bag provided until you arrive in Sri Lanka. Only give this form to a UNHCR staff member when you arrive.
- Fill in the Bank of Ceylon account application form and keep it safely in the UNHCR bag.
- UNHCR staff will also give you any other information that you may need to return safely.

If UNHCR is facilitating your voluntary return to Sri Lanka:

- UNHCR Sri Lanka staff will meet and greet you at the airport in Colombo to make sure you have arrived safely.
- UNHCR staff will assist you to complete immigration, security and customs formalities at the airport.
- UNHCR will open a bank account for you and transfer the UNHCR reintegration grant into it.
 - LKR 12,000 per adult
 - LKR 9,000 per child (under 18 years).
- UNHCR will provide you with a cash transport grant of LKR 4,000 to help you get back to your home in a safe and dignified manner.
- When you reach your town or village contact the closest UNHCR office to receive a kit of basic household items and register for protection monitoring.

WHEN YOU RETURN TO SRI LANKA

AT THE AIRPORT:

- Look for a UNHCR staff member wearing a blue UNHCR vest or shirt waiting before the immigration counters.
- UNHCR staff will accompany you through the arrival formalities before taking you to the UNHCR office in the airport.

AT THE UNHCR OFFICE IN THE AIRPORT:

- A bank account with the Bank of Ceylon will be opened in your name and the reintegration grant will be deposited in your new account.
- You will receive your transportation grant in cash to help you get from airport to your home.
- UNHCR staff will provide you with counseling and information regarding your return.
- The Voluntary Repatriation Form will be check by UNHCR staff.
- Keep the signed Voluntary Repatriation Form safely with you at all times.

IN THE DISTRICT OF RETURN:

- Register with the Grama Niladhari office of the Sri Lankan Government in your village. Take with you a copy of the VRF and your emergency travel document.
- Meet UNHCR Staff in your District of return
 - Take your Voluntary Repatriation Form with you.
 - Provide your contact details to UNHCR.
 - Inform UNHCR of any special needs or worries you or your family members may have.
 - Collect a kit of basic household items.
 - Attend the Mine Risk Education session.
 - Contact your DS Officer to ensure you are included in the WFP food distribution list.
 - Talk to your local public health office about health screening.
 - Inform UNHCR staff and the local authorities if you change your address.

GENERAL INFORMATION ON RETURNING TO SRI LANKA

LIVELIHOODS

- Earning a living or an income will be a priority for you. There are a number of opportunities in your area of return to restart your former livelihood activity or start a new income generating activity. There are some agencies in the North and East who can help you restart your livelihood or start up a small business.
- Ask your DS Officer or UNHCR staff which agencies are providing livelihood assistance in your area. You may approach them to request assistance.
- In the past, many refugee returnees have used the UNHCR reintegration grant to help start up a small business or buy farming or fishing equipment. You can also do this.
- The A9-road is open and there are no restrictions on transporting goods to and from the north. Prices of goods in the north and east, including essential food, are almost the same as in Colombo.
- Mine clearance is focussed mainly on residential areas, which means some farming land may still be mined. It is important to check with your DS or GN Officer, relatives, friends or neighbours in your village if your farming land is clear of mines.
- Previous restrictions on fishing have eased but have not been entirely lifted. In all districts, you must obtain passes to go out fishing. Check with your GN/DS on how to apply for a pass in your area.

EDUCATION

- Many schools that were damaged in the war have restarted across the north and east, but there is lack of resources like teachers, books and equipment.
- Many schools do not have an English-based curriculum.
- Parents should bring all documents and certificates from schools attended by their children outside Sri Lanka to get the Equivalent Education Certificate. This certificate will allow your children to attend any school in Sri Lanka.
- Once you return, you must show the certificates from schools attended in the country of asylum to the Ministry of Education (Isurupaya) in Colombo. Please contact your local DS regarding this and they will assist you in contacting relevant authorities.
- Ask UNHCR staff to refer you to the relevant authority or agency who will be able to assist you to convert your education certificates.

- Foreign university degree holders: If you have graduated from a university listed in the Commonwealth University Yearbook (check www.ugc.ac.lk), your degree will be recognised in Sri Lanka by the University Grants Commission (UGC).
- Once you return to Sri Lanka, please visit the UGC (No. 30, Ward Place, Colombo 7) or contact Mr. S.A.S Perera, Senior Staff Assistant, UGC (+94 11 2695301) for more information.
- Foreign diplomas such as for vocational programmes or from institutes are not accepted by the University Grants Commission.

HOUSING, LAND AND PROPERTY

- In January 2013, the Sri Lankan Government issued a circular called 'Accelerated Programme on Solving Post Conflict State Lands Issues in the Northern and Eastern Provinces'. This circular sets out the guidelines to solving issues related to State Land in the Northern Province.
- If you have any problems related to State Land (no land document, lost land document or land is occupied by others) please visit your DS or GN to obtain more information and submit your claim. Forms are available free of charge. (See attached document)

CIVIL DOCUMENTATION

- If you do not have, or have lost any civil documentation such as birth, marriage or death certificates, National Identity Cards contact your local DS Officer/ Local NGO OfERR who will be able to give you information and assist you to receive replacement documentation.
- UNHCR can also refer you to the relevant authority or agency to obtain assistance to get replacements.

CITIZENSHIP DOCUMENTAITON

If you require citizenship documentation for you or your family members contact the local DS (Registrar's Office) office. You could also contact the local OfERR office.

LEGAL AID COMMISSION

- If you require legal advice, for example, relating to housing, land and property issues or other civil disputes please contact the Legal Aid Commission Office in your district.
- UNHCR staff are able to provide you with the contact information

HEALTH

- In the North, health services have improved but are still limited, especially in rural areas.
- There are General Hospitals in the Jaffna, Vavuniya, Mannar and Trincomalee, Killinochchi and Mulaitivu town areas.
- Other districts of the Northern Province mostly have divisional level hospitals where you can also get treatment.
- The Vavuniya and Jaffna General Hospitals are the main hospitals for specialized treatment of patients coming from Vavuniya, Mannar, Mullaitivu and Killinochchi Districts.

UNHCR has more information on these and other topics for each district, please ask UNHCR staff during your voluntary repatriation counseling sessions.

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

A Look at Some Success Stories...



"We were very happy when we returned to our place of origin. In India we felt we were leading an isolated life without our relatives. Now we have our relatives and siblings close by" says refugee returnee, Rutley Fernando from Pesalai Mannar. Restarting life back in Sri Lanka was not easy for the Fernando family. Though back at home, they had to start life from scratch.

Three months after returning to Sri Lanka, Rutley was able to repair his/her damaged house with some money he/she had saved and the reintegration grant which he/she got from UNHCR. "My children were admitted to local school in 20 days", says Rutley, "and my husband was able to restart his traditional livelihood which is fishing". The Fernando family have applied to the Fisheries Society for permanent housing and hope that their application will be successful.

Samuel Sethukavalsingan, 33 is a daily labourer, living in Shanthapuram Kilinochchi. Samuel is happy to be a "refugee returnee from India" and has lots of hope for a bright future in his country of origin, Sri Lanka. He fled Sri Lanka in 1990 with his parents when he was just 10 years old and retuned to his home in May 2012. UNHCR facilitated his return.

According to Samuel, life was very tough when he first arrived. He had lots of hopes returning to Sri Lanka and to lead a successful life. Since he was a trained skilled worker in India, who earned relatively well as a painter, he dreamt of a similar livelihood in Sri Lanka. However, such livelihood opportunities were very limited in Kilinochchi when he arrived and he was disappointed. Nevertheless Samuel secured himself regular daily labour jobs in the town area. Samuel is happy that he has been offered land by the Government and was also selected to benefit from a permanent house.



Samuel added that many refugees in India are fearful of the security situation in Sri Lanka because of negative reports on the media and rumours, though Samuel feels it is a misconception.



Indirakumar and his family returned to Sri Lanka through the UNHCR Voluntary Repatriation Programme in 2012. The family used the reintegration grant provided by UNHCR for the construction of a temporary shelter on the land they used to live on before they left Sri Lanka. Indirakumar's family also received six-month WFP dry rations after their return to the village. Indirakumar worked as a painter and a tailor while he was in India. After he returned to Vavuniya he found work as a tailor in a shop and is able to support his families' daily needs. The Indrakumars' have received further assistance from an NGO called Danish Refugee Council "The agency gave me a cow so I could to raise my level of income and to have improved food security", he said. Indrakumar and his family firmly believe they made the right decision to return to their own land and to restart life surrounded by friends and relatives in Sri Lanka and are grateful to be back home.

"We returned to our own place in Jaffna after twenty two years of refugee camp life in India ... We came with lot of hope to enjoy our life here....but to rebuild life takes much time and effort... ... Still we have the confidence and the will power to make it happen. With the assistance from UNHCR we were able to build a makeshift shelter"
