

REGIONAL MONTHLY UPDATE: 3RP ACHIEVEMENTS AUGUST 2017

These dashboards reflect selected aggregate achievements of 3RP regional sectoral indicators on the humanitarian and resilience responses of more than 240 partners involved in the 3RP Inter-Agency Appeal in Egypt, Iraq, Jordan, Lebanon and Turkey. Indicators are regionally aggregated and targets are based on full funding of the 3RP 2017 and an expected population of 4.7 million refugees by end-2017.









The number of Syrian refugees in the region stood at 5.16 million at the end of August 2017. There are now almost 3 million Syrian refugees registered refugees in Turkey, over 1 million in Lebanon, some 660,000 in Jordan, almost 245,000 in Iraq and above 120,000 in Egypt, indicating the generosity of host countries across the region. Highlights of the Protection Sector across the region in August include:

In Egypt, multi-sectoral case management services assisted 959 children, adolescents and youth during August. The number of newly registered Syrian unaccompanied children continues to rise, with 21 registered during the reporting period. An inter-agency taskforce convened to specifically address the protection gaps for this group of children and identify additional support each organization can provide to ensure timely assistance and mitigate protection risks. A total of 133 staff of governmental and non-governmental entities were trained on child protection in Alexandria, Damietta and Greater Cairo. In Iraq, child protection prevention and response activities continued to be provided in and out of camps. Capacity building activities for community groups and the Department of Social Affairs were implemented within the sustainable framework for child protection programs for refugees in Kurdistan Region of Iraq. The Youth Committee in Sulaymaniyah wrote a play on themes such as child marriage and gender discrimination with the aim of addressing and prompting debate on different social issues. The committee exhibited the play during its tour of different areas within the governorate.











So far in 2017, food sector partners have reached approximately 2.48 million individuals with food assistance through cash, voucher or in-kind modality. This represents 98 per cent of the overall target for 2017. Over 6,400 individuals received food and agricultural livelihoods support while 13,565 individuals have been supported to improve nutritional practices. Some highlights of the Food Security Sector across the region in August include:

During the month of August, in Iraq non-camp and camp areas, refugees and their host community received training to improve their technical skills and know-how in vegetable crop cultivation in greenhouse and backyard gardens, and were provided with inputs and equipment that can quickly improve household food availability and income. In addition, beneficiaries received intensive training courses on food processing (bee-keeping and honey production) aiming to have a direct impact and good sustainable incomes.








As at the end of August, some 930,000 Syrian children across the region are enrolled in formal education in schools located in camps and host communities. Additionally, over 72,000 Syrian children are enrolled in non-formal education. So far over 2.3 million children have received school supplies. Some highlights of the Education Sector across the region in August include:

In an effort to reach all out-of-school children in Jordan, 3RP partners launched a new Learning for All Campaign in August, reaching 100,000 school-aged children with education messages, of whom 13,000 are out-of-school who received referral support to certified programmes.

In Iraq, preparations for a new cohort of tertiary scholarships for Syrian refugees and asylum seekers in 2017 have been finalized. This will enable 100 Syrian refugee students to access tertiary education in public universities in Kurdistan Region of Iraq. The call for applications will be announced during October 2017 in coordination with the Ministry of Higher Education and partners.

HEALTH AND NUTRITION

By the end of August, approximately 1.86 million primary health care consultations were provided, representing over 49 per cent of the 2017 overall target, and over 113,000 referrals were made to secondary or tertiary health care. The number of health facilities supported across the region stands now at 234, and over 3,500 health care staff has been trained. Some highlights of the Health and Nutrition Sector across the region in August include:

In Lebanon, almost 61,000 individuals have been assisted with their hospital bills. In Turkey, over 4,600 persons were provided with transportation to health facilities. In Iraq, medicine shortages remain a key concern in public facilities, particularly for patients with chronic diseases, overstretched the health system. Furthermore the irregular payment of salaries due to the ongoing financial crisis in the Kurdistan Region of Iraq has affected the provision of health services at public health facilities.








The continued strategic priority for the Basic Needs Sector is to provide assistance to meet the ongoing basic needs of Syrian refugees, based on a multi-sectoral household profiling and identification methodology, specific to each country. As of August, 234,747 households have received core relief items in-kind, which is just over 100 per cent of the targeted population. Approximately 442,500 households have received unconditional, sector specific or emergency cash assistance and over 203,600 households received seasonal support through cash or in-kind assistance. Some highlights of the Basic Needs Sector across the region in August include:

The Basic Needs Working Group in Jordan provided around USD 6,687,403 worth of regular cash and non-food items to vulnerable beneficiaries from the refugee and host community. In Turkey, some 1.59 million individuals have benefited from cash-based interventions since the beginning of the year.







During 2017, over 40,500 households living inside and outside camps have been reached with shelter assistance and shelter upgrades. Some highlights of the Basic Needs Sector across the region in August include:

A new vulnerable shelter support programme will be piloted in Jordan. This project will provide the most vulnerable households, living in very substandard conditions, with direct shelter repairs and maintenance. The project's works will be implemented 3RP partners using recycled materials where possible and cash for workers following referrals from field colleagues. Partners will verify all incoming referrals, granting final approval of eligibility and the scope of works necessary per household to elevate their shelter conditions to an adequate level and aiming to scale-up the programme to cover all extremely vulnerable shelter gaps in Zaatari camp.










So far in 2017, over 1.13 million individuals have benefited from access to adequate quantity of safe water through improved longer-term water systems. Approximately 331,800 people have gained access to appropriate sanitation facilities and services, and over 506,600 people have access to adequate quantity of safe water through temporary provision. Highlights of the WASH Sector across the region in August include:

The high temperatures felt across the region affected water demand. In Iraq (Domiz 1 camp) temperatures rose to over 45 degrees, resulting in increased use of water for coolers, and exacerbated by borehole breakdowns and increased illegal connections leading to loss of pressure on the network affecting many parts of the camp. The new water system in Azraq camp, Jordan, met the increased summer water needs, without any external tankering.

In Lebanon, the most disadvantaged localities in Tripoli, are being targeted to implement a common sanitation and drainage infrastructure project (one third is now completed), in coordination and collaboration with WASH committees, to help engage 35,000 beneficiaries through the project implementation.









Since the start of 2017, Livelihoods partners assisted 17,609 refugees and host community members with short-term and/or long-term employment opportunities and 69,367 youth and adults in increasing their employability through job training, internships, job placement and language courses. In addition, 37,863 host community members and refugees have participated in community based activities to promote social cohesion. Highlights across the region in August include:

In Lebanon, storm water network rehabilitation was completed in Kfarnabrakh village, Mount Lebanon Governorate, which will benefit 8,000 Lebanese and 1,400 Syrian refugees from flooding during peak rainy season. The improved network will enhance access to safe roads, protect households and pedestrians from flooding and improve hygiene conditions. Through the skills exchange project in Jordan, 89 young Jordanian women and men were trained by 48 Syrian experts in food specialties such as pickles, dairy products, Shawarma, pastries, snacks and other Arabic and international foods preparation. The programme not only aims at improving livelihoods and job opportunities for both refugees and host communities but enhance social cohesion in the host communities.
