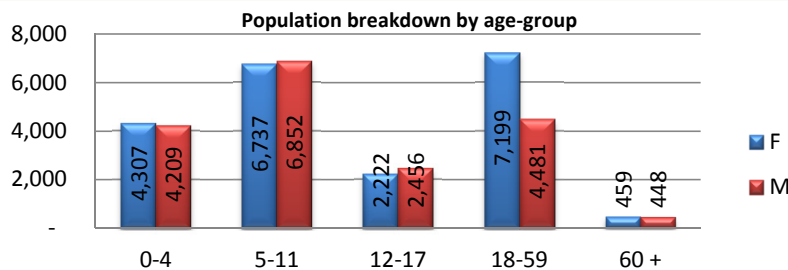

## Contextual Background

<b>Pattern in Population Change</b>	► Organized large-scale relocation from the Transit Centre will begin on November 2011
<b>Areas of Origin</b>	► 46% are from Gedo, 35% are from Bay, 15% are from Bakol, remaining are from various other locations in Somalia. ► Sunni Muslim
<b>Cultural Background</b>	► 64% are May May speakers from Rahanweyn clan, 22% are Mahatiri speakers from Maheren clan and the remaining are from various other Somali clans.
<b>Main Occupations</b>	► Pastoralists (livestock herding: goats, camels, cows, sheep and donkeys)

### Tips for Humanitarians

- UNHCR provides protection and monitors delivery of services to all refugees in Buramino Camp.
- Camp Management is done by ARRA with support from UNHCR.
- Camp Coordination Meetings, co-chaired by ARRA and UNHCR, are held weekly in Buramino Camp with humanitarian actors.
- All refugees in Buramino Camp are individually registered in UNHCR's proGres database and hold ration cards. Ration card numbers are useful for referral between partners and for distribution events. Refugees have been given a Proof of Registration document showing family-related and individual details, including each person's photo.
- Biometrics (fingerprinting) has been used for registering refugees living in Buramino. Biometrics assists in preventing double registration. No refugee household should have more than one ration card.
- Treatment of SAM (Severe Acute Malnutrition) and Treatment of MAM (Moderate Acute Malnutrition), for both Under 5's and MOC (Malnourished Other Categories) Programme, a targeted feeding programme for severely malnourished children between 5 years and 18 years

### Administrative Structure

#### Role of Ethiopian Government in Buramino

#### Role of Camp Residents in Self-Management

**Refugee Central Committee (RCC)** - is a resident coordination and leadership body that is consulted on multi-sectoral issues pertaining to camp life. It is made up of a Chairman, Vice chairman and Secretary, block leaders and women representatives. RCC has nine subcommittees in health, women issues, security, youth and children, women, environment and sanitation, population movement, food, executive committee. Block leaders gather information on each block in the camp, provide information to refugees living in each zone and advocate on behalf of their respective zone residents.

**Women's association** - runs a grinding mill (income generating project), mobilizes women's groups and represents women's interests in camp coordination.

**Food Distribution Committee** - provides information about food distribution to the community, assist with scooping and provide feedback on the quality of the food.

**Youth Committee** - Is a resident youth leadership body that represents youth in the camp on issues pertaining to the youth such as sports, recreational activities and hygiene promotion.

**Child Protection Committee** - works with Save the Children to assist in identification of children with specific

**Neighbourhood Watch Program** - responsible for crowd control and overall conflict management in the camp.

#### Local Administration

The Kebele Chairman (Bur and Amino) are responsible for local (non-refugee) administration on behalf of Dollo Ado Woreda, Somali Regional State, Ethiopia. The Kebele Chairman and his administrative committee are consulted about refugee-host community relationship, natural resource use and managing conflicts between the refugee and host communities, with the help of local elders.
