Winter in Lebanon: the context


Average temperature drops between October and February and range between **10°C and -5°C**

Exposure to cold is a **seasonal hardship**;

They usually live in **poor** / unprotected shelter conditions;

Casual labor opportunities **drop** significantly during winter;

Less means and increased needs....



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Winter in Lebanon: the context

What are the additional winter needs to cope with extreme temperatures?

→ Protecting and heating shelters: ceiling off kits, plastic sheeting, stoves, fuel

→ Keeping the children warm: winter clothes, blankets..

 \rightarrow Additional food to increase caloric intake

Vulnerability of the poorest increase in winter and therefore require additional support;

The cost of the additional seasonal needs range between \$66 and \$150 – HH visits data;

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Winter in Lebanon: the response

Response through different interventions over 5 months:

 \rightarrow Cash based interventions to the most vulnerable – 218,000 HHs

- \rightarrow Different packages:
 - → \$75 top-up to extreme vulnerable receiving MPC mitigate additional needs Syrian Refugees
 - → \$147 to poor Syrian refugees, Lebanese returnees, and Palestine refugees (elevation applies for returnees and Palestine refugees)
 - \rightarrow \$100 to poor Palestine refugees below 500m
 - → \$40/child top-up to vulnerable Lebanese, Palestine and Syrian refugees with children below 15 – monetized value of a clothing kit
 - \rightarrow Where cash is not possible, fuel vouchers will be distributed in lieu

Winter in Lebanon: the response

Response through different interventions over 5 months:

 \rightarrow Cash based interventions to the most vulnerable – 218,000 HHs



Economic vulnerability is the primary criteria for eligibility in addition to some shelter vulnerability considerations

Winter in Lebanon: the response

Response through different interventions over 5 months:

 \rightarrow In kind core relief items to support additional needs – 47,250 HHs

- \rightarrow Blankets
- \rightarrow Stoves
- \rightarrow Clothing kits
- \rightarrow Global target set, no altitude / population cohort differentiation
- ightarrow Distribution is based on needs identified by the field

 \rightarrow Public schools hosting Syrian refugees and Lebanese students at high elevations will be supported with fuel

→ Shelter weatherproofing in SSBs and ISSs – 55,000 HHs

→ Shelter interventions will focus on weatherproofing to increase the resistance of unprotected shelter to hazards – mainly SSBs
