



Key achievements

- Continuous advocacy efforts to address deportations resulted in significant decrease in confirmed forcible return rates.
- Protection Sector finalized key advocacy messages for 2017 that emphasize on the importance of taking arising issues into consideration and advocate for solutions with donors, government and humanitarian actors.
- Protection Sector continued strengthen linkages with other sectors including in the implementation of integrating IASC GBV guidelines across 6 sector.
- 30,444 WGBM out of 31,205 (98%) received legal information, counselling and/or representation
- 189,000 WGBM benefitted from Child Protection general awareness raising to achieve 74% out of this year target.
- Protection WG members have been kept abreast of the latest updates in regards to eligibility to go through UVE and refer cases to the special committee during information sessions offered by UNHCR legal team

Challenges faced during the reporting period

- Out of 38 organizations participating in Inter-Agency appeal in 2017 for the Protection Sector, only 28 reported receiving funds in the second quarter.
- Continued weakness by some sector members in reporting their progress and achievements especially in SGBV response and prevention activities.
- Commitment towards the coordination mechanism to the Syrian Response still needs to be more recognized by all sector members as not limited to attending coordination monthly meetings

Gaps and key priorities foreseen in the next quarter

◇ Gaps:

- Only 30% - 6 organizations out of 17 received funds prevented full implantation of planned needed GBV interventions.
- Lack of consistent humanitarian access to the BERM and closed border.


◇ Key Priorities:

- Strengthen advocacy towards key standing issues such as respect the principle of non-refoulement, consistent access to the BERM, enhance the living conditions of refugees living in the Azraq Camp (Speeding up the screening process in V5) and resolving legal issues related to documentation.
- Preparatory analysis in advance of 2018 Jordan Response Plan efforts.
- Strengthen reporting and monitoring of activities and progress towards goals by means of continuous training of partners agencies, promotion of reporting requirements, and analysis of the collected data on the sector implementation.
