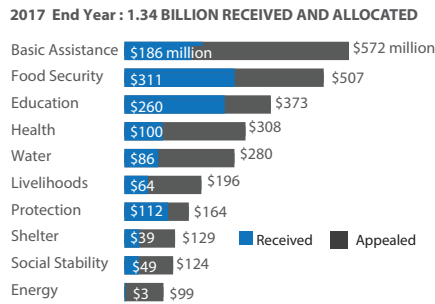
**Inter-Agency

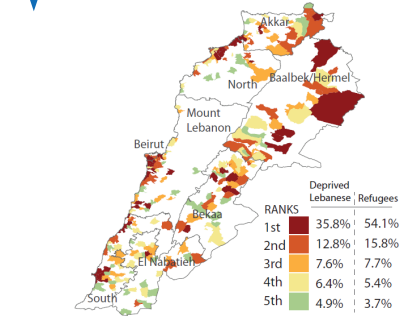
