





## Creating Jobs with Healthier Cooking Technology

Since September 2016, Inyenyeri, a Rwandan social enterprise, has operated a shop inside Kigeme refugee camp employing 5 refugees while tackling the problem of toxic smoke from traditional cooking with firewood and charcoal.




The average refugee needs about 0,2 kg of pellets per day at a cost of 5 US cents (35 rwf).

## Pellets + Stove

Refugees in Kigeme Camp are able to subscribe to an Inyenyeri membership using cash transfers from UNHCR on MasterCards in exchange for environmentally friendly fuel pellets bundled with a high-tech clean cookstove.

## **Livelihoods Strategy**

The creating of a market for fuel pellets enables refugees to obtain decent jobs in the pellet value chain. Currently refugees are employed within retail and maintenance, but they are also expected to be involved in pellet production in the long-term.



## **Impact**

Refugees have voluntarily signed up for this solution because they need and want it.



127 randomly selected households became clients in 2016 pilot



87 % continue to purchase fuel pellets 13 % unable to afford fuel pellets
