



Along with in-kind support and services, **UNHCR uses cash to protect and assist people** in all phases of displacement to meet their basic and other needs.

**Cash is the means and not the objective.** Saving lives and protecting people comes first. The choice of modality to assist and protect people and build their resilience is context-specific.

## POLICY ON CASH ASSISTANCE

Inclusive of partners, UNHCR's vision for cash assistance for its increased innovative and systematic use is outlined in the **5-year Policy** on Cash-Based Interventions and the **UNHCR Strategy** for the Institutionalisation of Cash-Based Interventions.

### **CASH AND PROTECTION**

Cash, together with in-kind assistance and services, helped prevent displaced people from resorting to negative survival strategies, such as child labour. In 2018, UNHCR provided more than 30 % of its overall cash to meet specific protection outcomes.

# **INNOVATION AND PARTNERSHIP:** UNHCR is implementing innovative and inclusive assistance with collective efficiencies.

The Common Cash Facility (CCF) provides humanitarian actors with direct and equal access to a common financial service provider. In Jordan, the CCF provides cash assistance to vulnerable refugees outside of camp in Jordan. UNHCR and the Cash Learning Partnership (CaLP) conducted a <u>review of the Common Cash Facility (CCF)</u>. It concluded the CCF to be a secure, efficient and innovative cash transfer approach that has enabled predictable cash payments to be made at scale to refugees while streamlining multiple organizations' cash transfer programmes. UNHCR is now systematically expanding the CCF to all operations.



## 2019 DIRECTION

UNHCR will continue to focus on the expansion and quality of cash assistance to achieve protection outcomes, improve access to services and enable financial inclusion and social protection. Common cash systems with partners remain a key priority.
