

GUIDANCE ON RAPID PROTECTION ASSESSMENTS

JULY 2018

The RPA is designed to gather critical data on emerging and escalating protection concerns and provide a quick overview of the protection situation in a given location. Information is gathered at the community level in relation to a specific scenario or set of circumstances.

Objectives

- Identify immediate community-level protection concerns: for relevant stakeholders with the goal of having an immediate life-saving or lifesustaining impact, either through programmatic delivery or advocacy
- Inform the initial protection response: with particular focus on persons
 with specific needs, including CP and GBV, as well as to inform subsequent
 protection monitoring and technical assessments (including child protection
 and GBV) conducted by specialized interviewers with broader community
 participation.
- Conduct or update existing service mapping: to ensure up-to-date information on available services and referral pathways.
- Inform guidance to non-protection humanitarian actors: on how to provide assistance in a particular context in a manner consistent with protection principles.

Methodology

Assessors use **observation**, **key informant interviews**, **focus group discussions** (disaggregated by age and sex) and/or community discussions to collect information related to protection.

Staffing

Normally the RPA will be conducted by a team of 2-5 persons, balancing male and female staff, trained in the RPA tools and methodology. A team leader should be responsible for overseeing the deployment of the RPA, including selection of participants

Tools

The methodology of the RPA is flexible to adapt to the possibilities and constraints of each protection situation, using a combination of models:

- <u>Direct Observation</u>: Structured observation of the location, which may involve asking simple questions of neighbors, shopkeepers or passers-by in order to understand what is happening—and not happening.
- <u>Key informants:</u> Semi-structured interviews with individuals (normally 3-6 interviews) who have special knowledge of what is happening. Depending on the nature of the emergency, the matrix suggests which key informants are likely to be relevant.
- <u>Focus group discussions:</u> Semi-structured group discussions (normally 2-4 FGDs) with groups of 10-15 persons grouped according to their sex and age.
- <u>Community discussions:</u> Structured group discussions (normally 1-2 discussions) with groups of more than ten persons who are generally not grouped according to their sex and age. Used when it is not possible to organize focus group discussions or to help expedite comparing and analysing results from multiple FGDs. It provides more quantitative feedback around protection issues.

1. Site Details	 Has any civilian infrastructure been affected? Indicate type and extent (school, health centre, destroyed, temporarily used as shelter) What kind of shelter are people living in? Please provide details (overcrowding, separation of women/men). What is the state of other infrastructure? 	
2. Population Details	 Approximately how many displaced persons are here in comparison to the host population? Are there a disproportionate number of women or children? Are there elderly or injured people? Do people appear to show symptoms of trauma or psychosocial distress? Are there any population groups or demographics not seen in public places (i.e persons living with disability, young men) 	
3. Access to services	 Are there signs that humanitarian assistance is being distributed or services are available? Indicate who is distributing what assistance. Can any functioning health facilities be observed? Can a school be observed? Are there signs of individuals bringing water to the location? How far is the nearest watersource? And who usually brings the water? In case the location has communal bathing facilities or latrines, are there separate facilities for males and females? Is there a working light around toilet facilities/latrines? Is there a water source in the location? Are individuals waiting for long periods to access? Is there a place where children and young people meet to play or socialise 	
4. Specialized protection needs	 What daily activities can you observe being done by the following groups during the visit? (Women, Men, Girls, Boys) What do you observe about other groups, such as elderly or people with disabilities during the visit? Are there signs of specific isolation or neglect of some persons or groups? Specify who and to what extent Can any care arrangements for persons with physical disabilities be observed? Can any care arrangements for separated and unaccompanied children be observed? Does the location of the school create risks for children?

	 Does the state of the school building create risks for children? Does the location of bathrooms create risks for women and girls? Does the location of the water point create risks for women and girls? 	
5. Physical Safety	 Are there signs that people in the location could be in danger for any reason? Are there signs that individuals have been killed or are being mourned? Are there any signs of limitations of movement for the population or your access to the area, such as roadblocks, checkpoints? What government institutions function normally in the area? Are there signs of risks from natural hazards? Are there signs of immediate threats to safety (i.e. fire, UXO/ERW, open water)? 	
6. Social Cohesion	 Are there signs of tensions between groups in the population (i.e. displaced and host)? 	
7. Other concerns	Any other concerns observed

Example introduction

"Hello my name is XX and I work for XX (organization). We are trying to understand better the situation here so that we can better protect people or ask persons with authority to do it. I would like to ask you some questions about the situation here. Your participation is voluntary and you can choose not to answer any or all of the questions. Any personally identifiable information that you provide will be kept strictly confidential. However, if you agree to participate, your responses will help us to better understand the protection-related challenges and will enable us to try to address them, if solutions are available in your area. Do you agree with the interview?"

What activities do adolescent boys and girls including youth engaged in? In your opinion, which persons are affected most by the situation in this place? Are there any problems of housing, land and property, e.g. evictions? 	
5. Physical Safety	 What are the causes of death and injury of the population? Is the population able to move freely and safely in and out of the location? Have mines or ERWs been found here? 	
6. Social Cohesion	Are there signs of tensions between groups in the population (i.e. displaced and host)?	
7. Other concerns	Are there any other concerns you would like to raise?

Explain clearly the aim and nature of the FGD (e.g. "we are here to collect some information on the experiences
and opinions of people, who have been affected by displacement; this collection of information is part of a larger
national data collection/research, with the aim to better understand the impact of displacement and how to bring
about its resolution").

- Introduce yourself, as the facilitator, the note taker(s), and translator; clarify what your roles are.
- Clarify the intended use of the FGD outcomes and what is expected of the participants; (e.g. "the information we collect will be used by many different organizations working with IDPs; the collection of information is not linked to any specific project and we can't offer you anything for your participation, besides our appreciation!").
- Explain that participants will remain anonymous; (e.g. "we do not note your names and they will not appear anywhere in the information filed").
- Set the ground rules for the discussion; (e.g. "we are interested in opinions and experiences of everyone present, so do give time and space to each other to contribute", "please, raise your hand, if you wish to contribute, so we can organize the discussion", "do avoid parallel discussions, as that will make it very difficult for the note taker to capture the discussion", "do respect the opinions of others, we are interested in all different views, even if they don't represent everyone in the community" etc.).
- Explain how the participants will receive feedback.
- Ask for permission to take notes and, if relevant, to record the discussion.

To be read to respondent at the start of the interview

"Hello my name is XX and I work for XX (organization). I would like to ask you some questions about the protection-related challenges you and your household may be facing. Your participation is voluntary and you can choose not to answer any or all of the questions. Any personally identifiable information that you provide will be kept strictly confidential. However, if you agree to participate, your responses will help us to better understand the protection-

related challenges you face and will enable us to try to address them, if solutions are available in your area. Do you agree to take part of the FGD?"

1. Population Details	 When, how, and from where were people displaced? Do you anticipate more people from your area of origin to come? Do you know when people might come? Why did they not leave with you? What are your future intentions? Are you aware of any elderly, disabled or injured people? Are you aware of any unaccompanied or separated children? 	
2. Access to services	 What are the main problems you encounter in terms of health, education, food, water, or other needs? Can you rank those problems? Who is more affected by obstacles or barriers to assistance (age, gender and identity)? Are you aware of where to access any of the following services (health, nutrition, education, food, child support, women's services, persons with disabilities, legal assistance, psychosocial support, other)? How do the families get by? What are your subsistence means/strategies? Who provides support to UASC, the elderly, child headed households, people living with disabilities and single mothers. 	
3. Specialized protection needs	 What are the main risks or challenges faced by women and girls in your community? Men and boys? Do you and your family members have their Identification papers (IDs, Birth Certificates and Marriage form)? If not, why? Do you know how to get it? Do you know where to go to register the child? If Yes, how many children obtained the birth certificate since the displacement? Do young children face any unique risks or threats? Are children able to attend school? Are there any other groups (youth, older persons, persons with disabilities) that experience extraordinary risks or challenges? 	
4. Physical Safety	 In which situations do you not feel safe? Mention incidents you know of (not necessarily personal). Have persons in the community been killed, injured or harmed by the war (airstrikes, shelling, landmines, etc.)? Has anyone you know personally experienced or witnessed violence recently? Have you heard of any one being restricted in their movement to other places? What were the circumstances?

	 Have you observed any children in your family being exposed directly to the war? Do you know if any children were injured or affected by conflict, mines or UXOs? 	
5. Social Cohesion	How are relations between the host community and IDPs? Have you noticed other points of tension in the community?	
6. Other concerns	 Are there any other concerns you would like to share today? Do you have any potential recommendations or solutions you would like to raise?

To address data analysis challenges while retaining the idea of focus group discussions, a more structured community discussion approach can be defined:

- A series of statement is developed in order to cover Protection Cluster's main concerns. Discussions will be structured around the recording of agreement level for each of the statements. It is best used when focused on one specific area of concern.
- The statement should be read exactly as it is written to the group. It is important that all groups understand the same statement.
- A maximum of 3 minutes will be given for the group to find a consensus on a level of agreement.
- If after 3 minutes, no agreement can be found, then the "no agreement" box should be ticked and reasons for disagreement to be documented.
- This will help obtain better quantitative data around protection issues.
