



In 2008, the largest new displacement in the world occured in the Philippines where 600,000 people fled fighting between the Government and armed groups in the southern region of Mindanao.¹





The Muslim Minority

Though Filipino Muslims represent a religious minority of only 5% of the total population, they have inhabited the southern Philippines since the 15th century. The Moro rebel groups emerged in early1970s with the goal of an independent Muslim nation. Despite the creation in 1990 of the Autonomous Region in Muslim Mindanao, clashes with the Armed Forces of the Philippines (AFP) still continue.³



Armed Conflicts

For four decades, the Government has had to address intermittent armed conflicts, including with the Moro and the communist insurgencies. While the Moro groups are concentrated in Mindanao and seek autonomy, Gingoog the communists Cagayan de Oro are spread throughout the archipelago and claim for the establishment of a communist-led society.6 As of 2 July, 380 people have been killed Incidents in 2009 and 170 injured since the

five-vear-old ceasefire has been

broken in August 2008.
