Full Country Name: Republic of Togo

Area: 56,500 sq miles **Population:** 4.7 million

Capital City: Lomé; Population: 500,000

People: Ewe, Dagomba and Kabye are the main ethnic groups.

Language(s): French is the official language. Kabiye and Ewe are the most widely

spoken of the African languages.

Religion(s): Christianity, Islam and indigenous beliefs are all practised.

Currency: CFA Franc

Head of State: President Faure Gnassingbe

Prime Minister: Edem Kodjo

GEOGRAPHY

The Togolese Republic lies in West Africa, forming a narrow strip stretching north from a coastline of about 50 km (30 miles) on the Gulf of Guinea. It is bordered by Ghana to the west, by Benin to the east, and by Burkina Faso to the north. The climate in the coastal area is hot and humid, with an average annual temperature of 27°C (81°F), rainfall in this zone averages 875 mm (34.4 ins) per year, and is heaviest during May—October. Precipitation in the central region is heaviest in May—June and in October, and in the north, where the average annual temperature is 30°C (86°F), there is a rainy season from July—September. The official languages are French, Kabiye and Ewe. About one-half of the population follows animist beliefs, while about 35% are Christians and 15% Muslims. The national flag (approximate proportions 3 by 5) has five equal horizontal stripes, alternately green and yellow, with a square red canton, containing a five-pointed white star, in the upper hoist. The capital is Lomé. (Europa World) [1]

RECENT HISTORY

Current day Togo was, from 1894, part of the German protectorate of Togoland. In 1919, the French took over the eastern part of Togoland under a league of Nations Mandate. The British took over the western part. In 1956, in a UN organised plebiscite, the majority of the population of British Togoland chose to merge with the neighbouring Gold Coast colony. The following year that region became part of the newly independent state of Ghana. French Togoland voted in 1956 to become part of the French Community. In 1960 the territory voted in favour of independence, which was granted in 1960. Sylvanus Olympio, the leader of the Comite d'Unite Togolaise, became President.

Olympio was killed in 1963 in a military coup led by then Sergeant Etienne Gnassingbe

Eyadema. Eyadema invited Olympio's brother-in-law Nicolas Grunitzky to form a civilian government. However, the military refused to allow a multiparty political system to develop, and Eyadema eventually took full power in 1967, creating a one party state under a new political party, the Rassemblement du Peuple Togolais, (RPT) in 1969.

Eyadema's rule was dictatorial. All independent political activity was repressed. In 1977, Gilchrist Olympio, the son of the first President, was accused of being behind an attempted invasion from neighbouring Ghana. Plots to overthrow Eyadema throughout the 1970s and 80s, whether real or not, served as a pretext for further repression of opposition activity and purges within the army. RECENT EVENTS AND POLITICAL DEVELOPMENT

On February 4 2005 Eyadema died. The military took over and installed Eyadema's son Faure Gnassingbe in power. After protests from the African Union and the regional body ECOWAS, Gnassingbe stood down. (Foreign and Commonwealth Office Country Profile, Politics, dated 29 January 2007) [4a] On the day that he stood down as president he was adopted as the candidate for the ruling party, the Rassemblement du people Togolais (RPT), in the forthcoming presidential elections. (Europa World) [1] Violent protests surrounded the elections, and these protests grew when the results were announced: Gnassingbe won 60% of the vote while main opposition candidate Bob Akitani received 38%. On May 4, Gnassingbe was sworn into office. In June, Gnassingbe appointed opposition leader Edem Kodjo as prime minister. In Aug. 2006, the government and six political parties signed an agreement calling for the creation of a transitional government that would include opposition parties. (Infoplease) [3] The next scheduled National Assembly elections are due to take place on 24 June 2007, and the next Presidential Election in 2010. (African Elections Database) [35]

ECONOMY

Basic Economic Facts

GDP: US\$2.0bn (2005) **Annual Growth:** 1.6% (2005)

Togo's economy has been damaged by its long-term isolation from international donors, and its small industrial sector is in long term decline. Agriculture, phosphate mining and revenues and employment from the international port have provided the country with the means to survive. The port's activity has increased since the troubles in Cote d'Ivoire, and 're-export' (processing incoming goods for export within the subregion) is now the largest export sector. However, the cotton sector has been damaged by mismanagement and low international prices.

The parastatal in charge of the phosphate sector was put into private management in 2001, but the state took back management control in 2003. The volumes of phosphates mined have declined in recent years, mainly due to depletion of readily accessible reserves. Privatisations in the banking and telecoms sector are stalled. It is hoped that the West Africa Gas pipeline project, which will supply Togo with Gas from Nigeria, will make energy cheaper and help to alleviate Togo's balance of payments problems. HUMAN RIGHTS

The United States State Department (USSD) 2006 Country Report on Togo stated:

"Togo, with a population of 5.5 million, is a republic governed by President Faure Gnassingbe, who was declared president in April 2005 in an election marred by severe irregularities. President Gnassingbe replaced his father, former president Gnassingbe Eyadema, who died in February 2005 after 38 years in power. Eyadema and his party Rally of the Togolese People (RPT), strongly backed by the armed forces, dominated politics and maintained firm control over all levels of the country's highly centralized government until his death. The civilian authorities generally did not maintain effective control of the security forces". [4a]

According to the Foreign and Commonwealth Office "Togo's Human Rights record under Eyadema was appalling, as documented in dozens of reports from international organisations and NGOs. The security forces, especially the army, which is largely staffed with Eyadema loyalists from the north, have been responsible for most of the abuses. A report published in 1999 by Amnesty International on events surrounding the 1998 presidential elections claimed that hundreds of opposition supporters had been killed. Despite being virulently criticised by the government, the report's findings were largely confirmed in 2001 by a joint African Union - UN commission of enquiry". [2a]

The USSD 2006 report went on to say:

"The human rights situation in the country improved (over the last year); however, serious human rights problems continued including:

- Inability of citizens to change their government
- Beatings and abuse of detainees
- Government impunity
- Harsh prison conditions
- Arbitrary and secret arrests and detention
- Lengthy pre-trial detention
- Executive control of the judiciary

- Frequent infringement of citizens' privacy rights
- Severe restrictions on the press, including closing media outlets
- Restrictions on freedom of assembly and movement
- Harassment of human rights workers
- Female genital mutilation (FGM) and violence against women
- Discrimination against women and ethnic minorities
- Trafficking in persons, especially children
- Child labour
- Lack of worker's rights in export procession zones (EPZs)" [2a]
