New Documentation

The state of the state Humanitarian Aid, UNHCR is engaging additional staff to carry out registration, issue documentation, and conduct refugee status determination.



A new ID card will soon be issued to persons registered with UNHCR in Indonesia - the same card will be issued to both refugees and asylum-seekers. Your current card or certificate will remain valid until you receive a new card.

Resettlement Places are Very Limited

- Resettlement is **not an automatic right available** to all refugees.
- There are now more than 22 million refugees globally, and countries receive less than 1% through resettlement each year.
- Resettlement places are so limited that most refugees in Indonesia will not be able to benefit from resettlement.
- The number of resettlement places allocated to Indonesia is decided by resettlement countries – not by UNHCR.
- With limited places for resettlement, priority must be given to the most vulnerable among the refugee population.



The **length of time** a refugee has been residing in Indonesia is **not considered** when identifying persons for resettlement.

- If an asylum-seeker is found to be vulnerable and in need of resettlement, UNHCR will carry out refugee status determination on a priority basis before submission.
- If you have **relatives in third countries** they can obtain government approach options for about possible information sponsoring you and your family. Most countries have such programs, but eligibility requirements differ from country to country. UNHCR is not involved in the processing of private sponsorship, but we can provide guidance on these opportunities.

Prepare for Your Future

- With such limited places for resettlement from Indonesia, focus energies on activities that will enrich your life.
- Use your special talents and skills by volunteering to support other refugees and your host community.
- Engage in **sports** and other positive **recreational activities**.
- Learn Bahasa Indonesia to engage with the Indonesian people who have welcomed you into their community.
- Participate in local Indonesian cultural events.
- Take advantage of educational opportunities for yourself and your children.
- Enroll in vocational training programs and online university courses.
- Expand your skills and experience through internships and apprenticeships.
- Always respect the laws and customs of Indonesia, and remember that you are a guest in this country.

Other Solutions

- As resettlement places are extremely limited in Indonesia other options may be available, including returning to your country if you are able to do so safely.
- Contact UNHCR for current information on conditions for return to countries of origin and to discuss available options. All returns are completely voluntary.
