## **Objectives:**

- Identify future key actions -- and the actors who need to take them - to better achieve collective protection outcomes and support effective implementation of the IASC Protection Policy.

## **Outputs:**

- A report (without attribution) for the IASC and wide dissemination that comprehensively reflects the substance of discussions and sets out key areas for future consideration.
- A basis for follow up actions that may be encouraged/adopted during the stock-take discussions or beyond, such as:
  - Recommended actions to HCs, Heads of Mission/Country Directors, Cluster Lead Agencies, and other actors
  - Commitments for follow up discussions among smaller groups of actors, to take forth discussions at country level, etc
