True makings of a success

- 1,400 pledges
- 350 good practices

Diverse participation

3,000+ participants, including 4 Heads of State/ Government, 70+ refugees, 90+ ministers and high-level government officials, 130+ private sector participants, 300+ other stakeholders



Plenary session opened by UNHCR, Switzerland, the United Nations Secretary-General, Costa Rica, Ethiopia, Germany, Pakistan and Turkey



6 high-level dialogues corresponding to the areas of focus



4 special events to launch the support platforms (MIRPS, IGAD and SSAR) and the Global Academic Interdisciplinary Network)

35 speakers' corner presentations

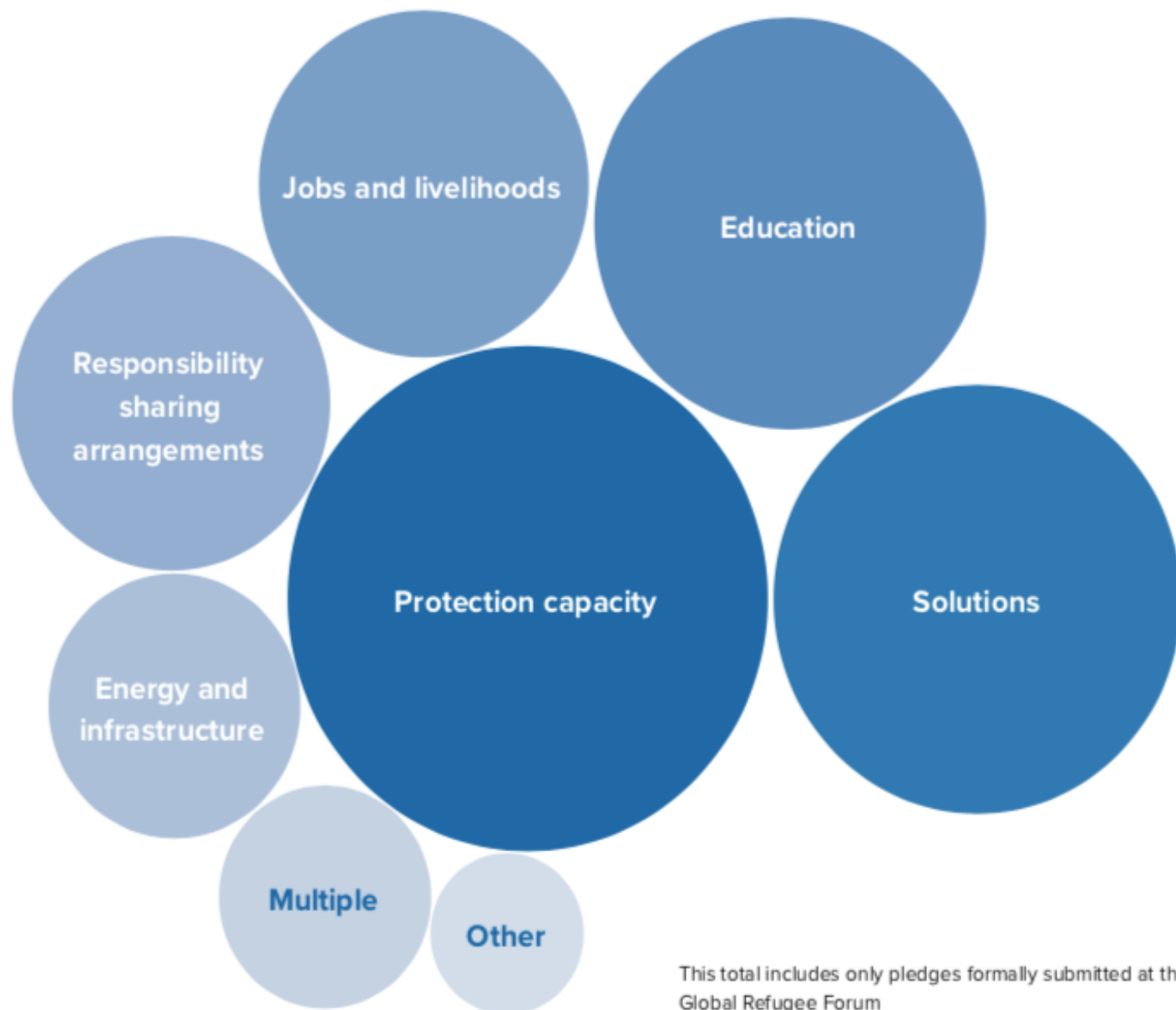

"Solidarity Train" travelling across France to Switzerland, to spread the message of solidarity and refugee inclusion, arrived on the eve of the GRF

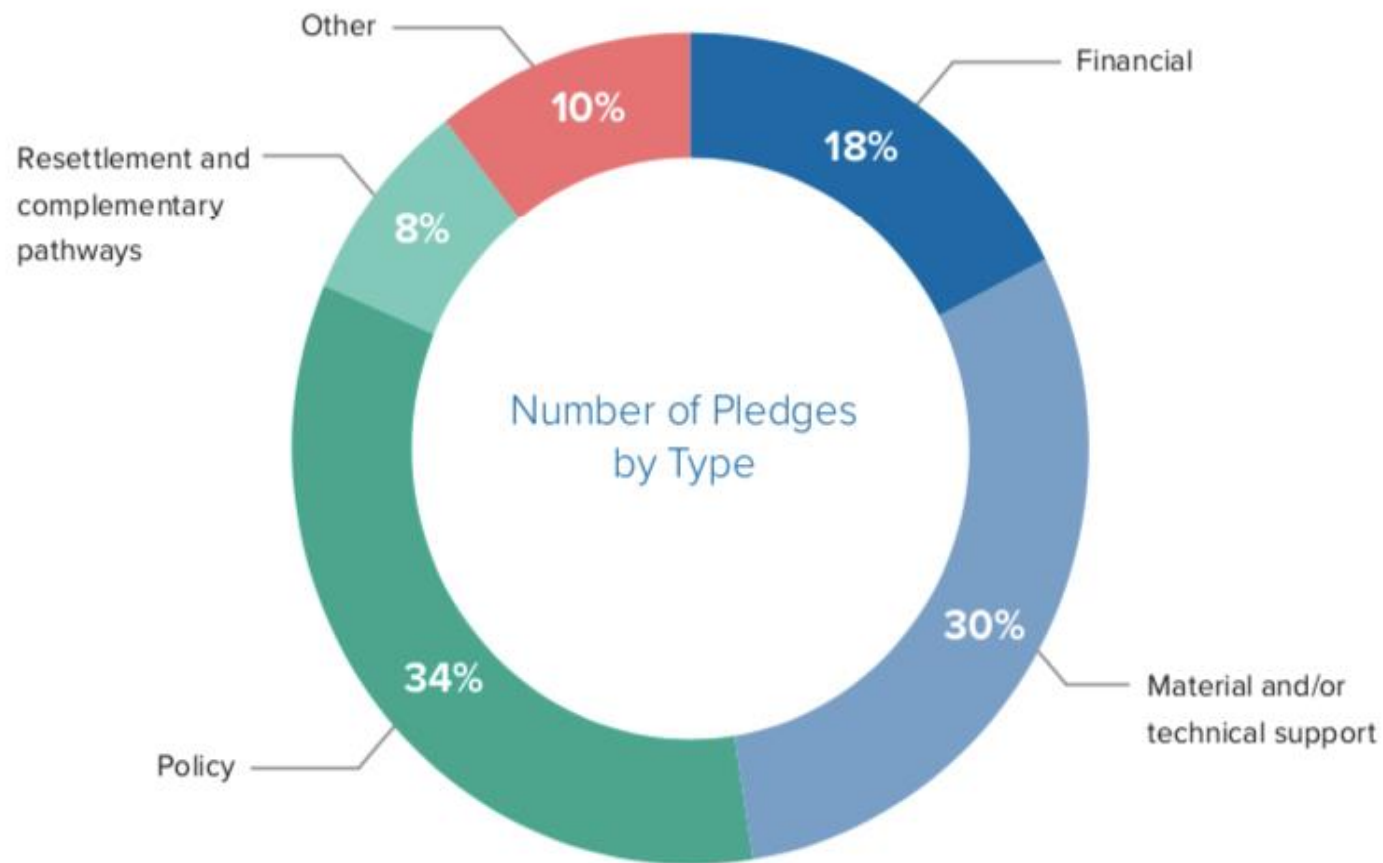
- 250 financial pledges made in total – States, development actors, private sector and others – **concretization is needed**
- Protection capacity, solutions and education constitute the bulk of pledges made

Number of Pledges by Area of Focus



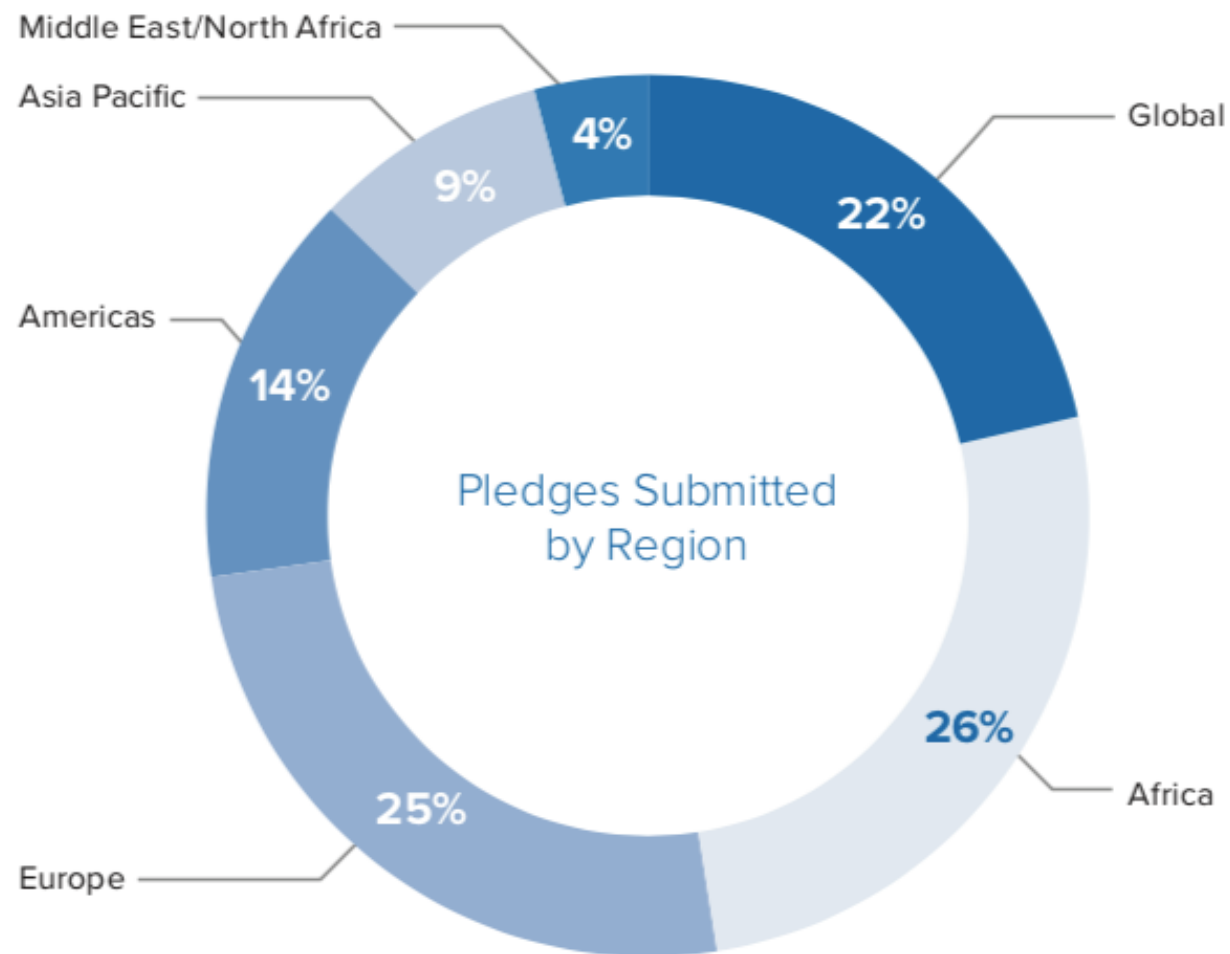
This total includes only pledges formally submitted at the Global Refugee Forum

- Significant law and policy pledges
→ massive potential for **matching** with financial pledges
- Nearly half of pledges were made by **States** and more than half by **other stakeholders**



- Pledges from **Africa** and **Europe** made up more than 50% of pledges
- **Global** pledges represented 22%

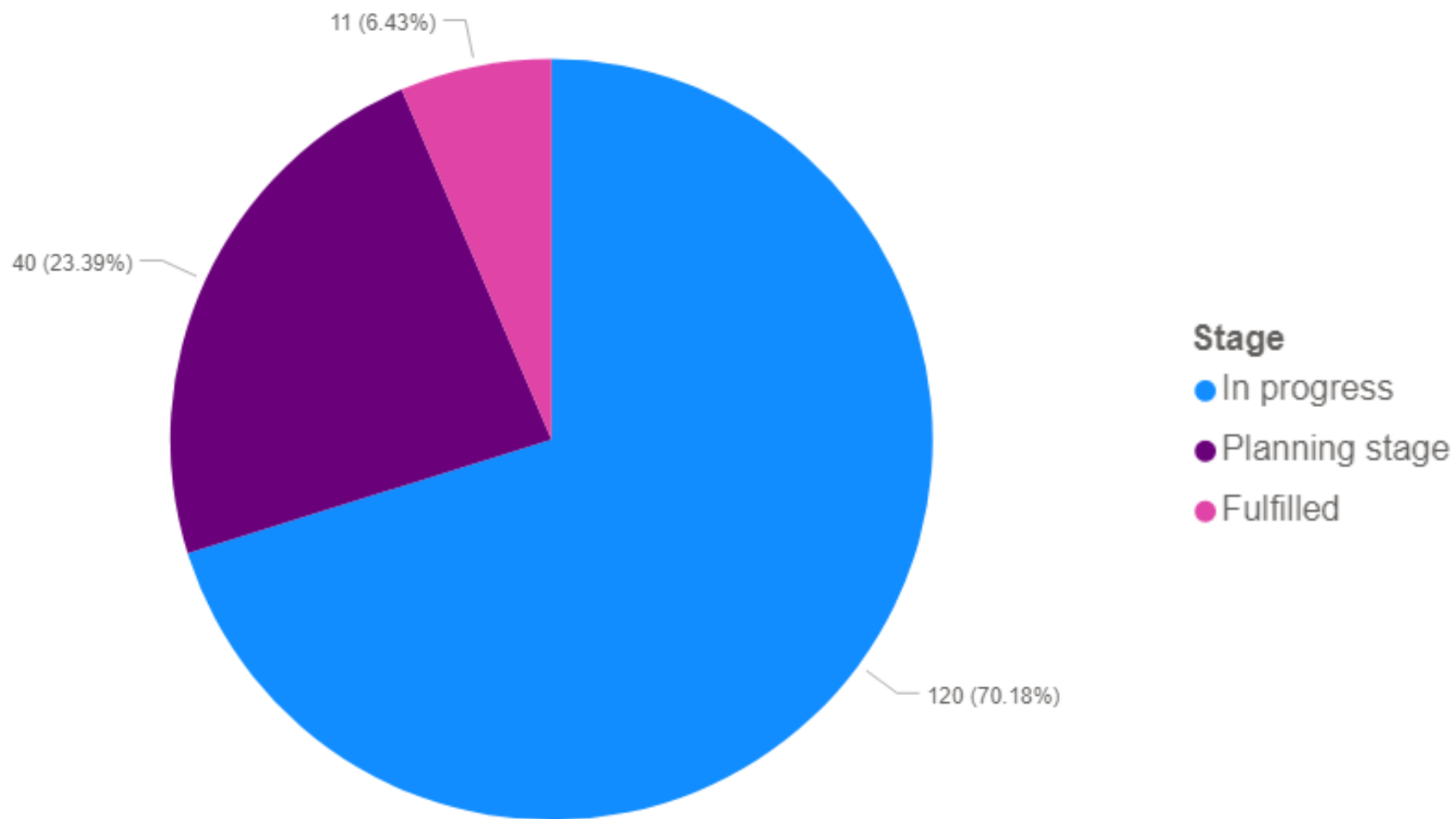

- 4. Future planning:** Lessons learned to inform strategic development of future pledges

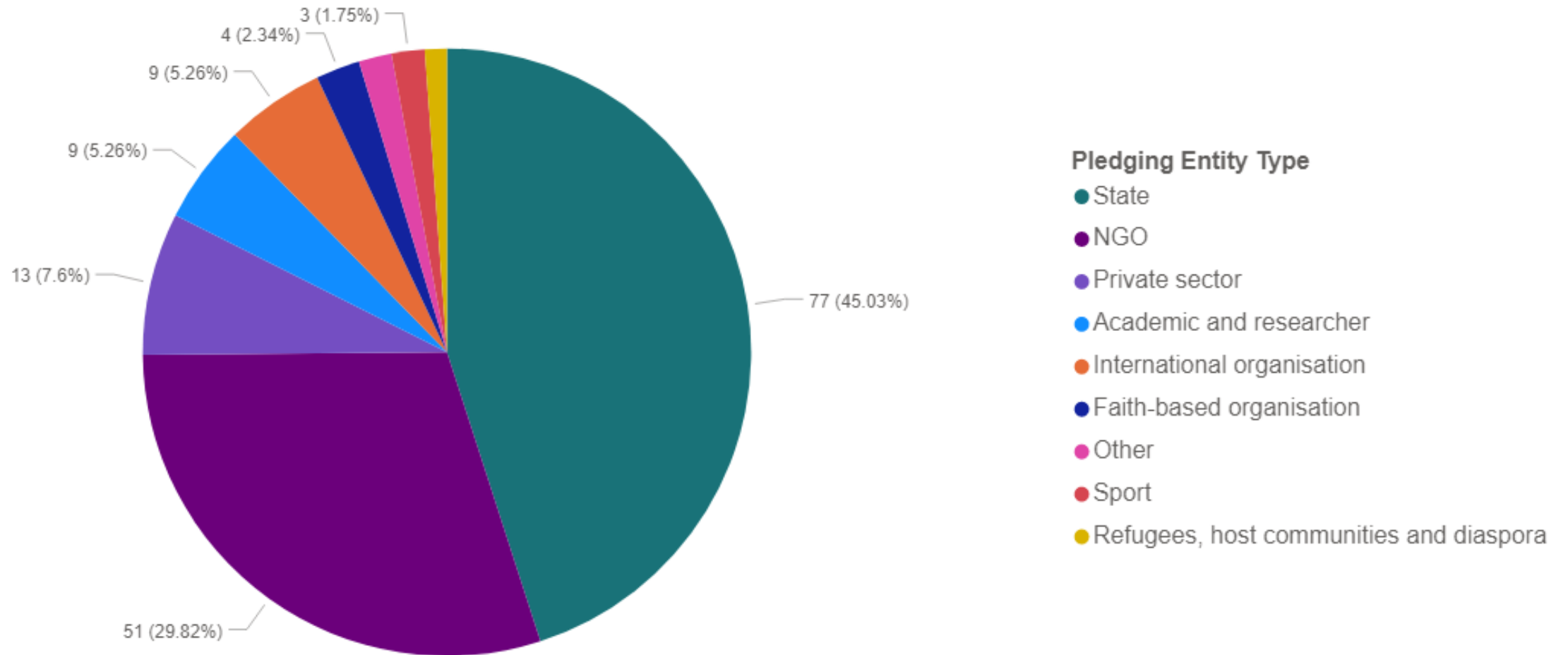

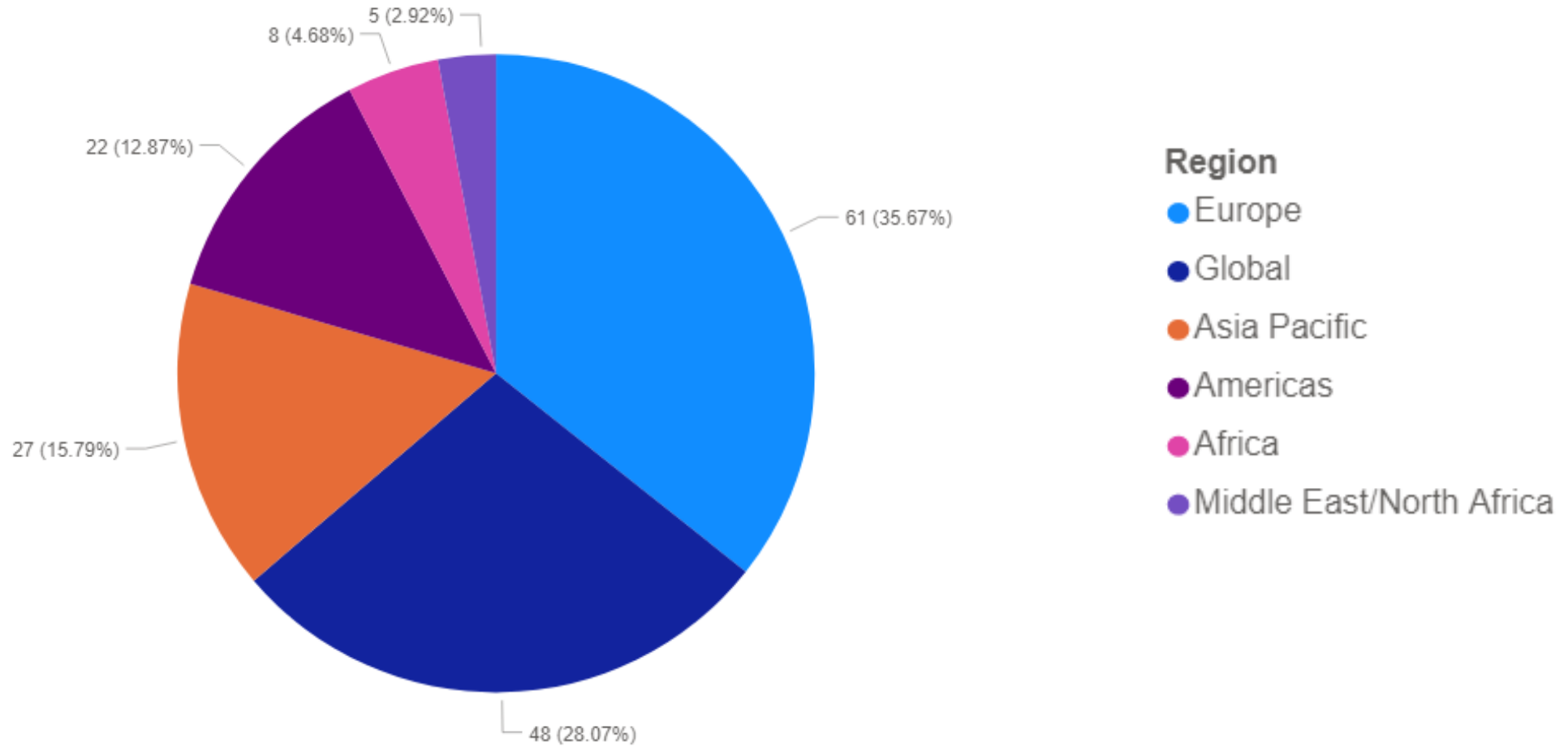
Progress in pledge implementation

Asylum Capacity Support Group (ACSG)

- The Asylum Capacity Support Group (ACSG) will act as mechanism for coherent and consistent support to increase the capacity of national asylum/Refugee Status Determination (RSD) systems by matching requests for and offers of asylum capacity support
- An expanded Guide to the ACSG Working Modalities has been sent out to Member States this week
- An ACSG online portal is planned to be established as a centralized source for information about the ACSG and the matching process

Three-Year Strategy (2019-2021) on Resettlement and Complementary Pathways

- UNHCR operations continue resettlement programming
 - interviews, counseling and submissions have continued despite constraints
 - new methods of working and innovations can lead to improved processes
- Jan – April 2020: 16,974 UNHCR resettlement submissions
9,758 refugees departed for resettlement (50% ↓)
- Three Year Strategy on Resettlement and Complementary Pathways remains a valid blueprint for increasing resettlement and expanding access to complementary pathways
- The ATCR continues to take place through a series of 8 virtual, thematic sessions

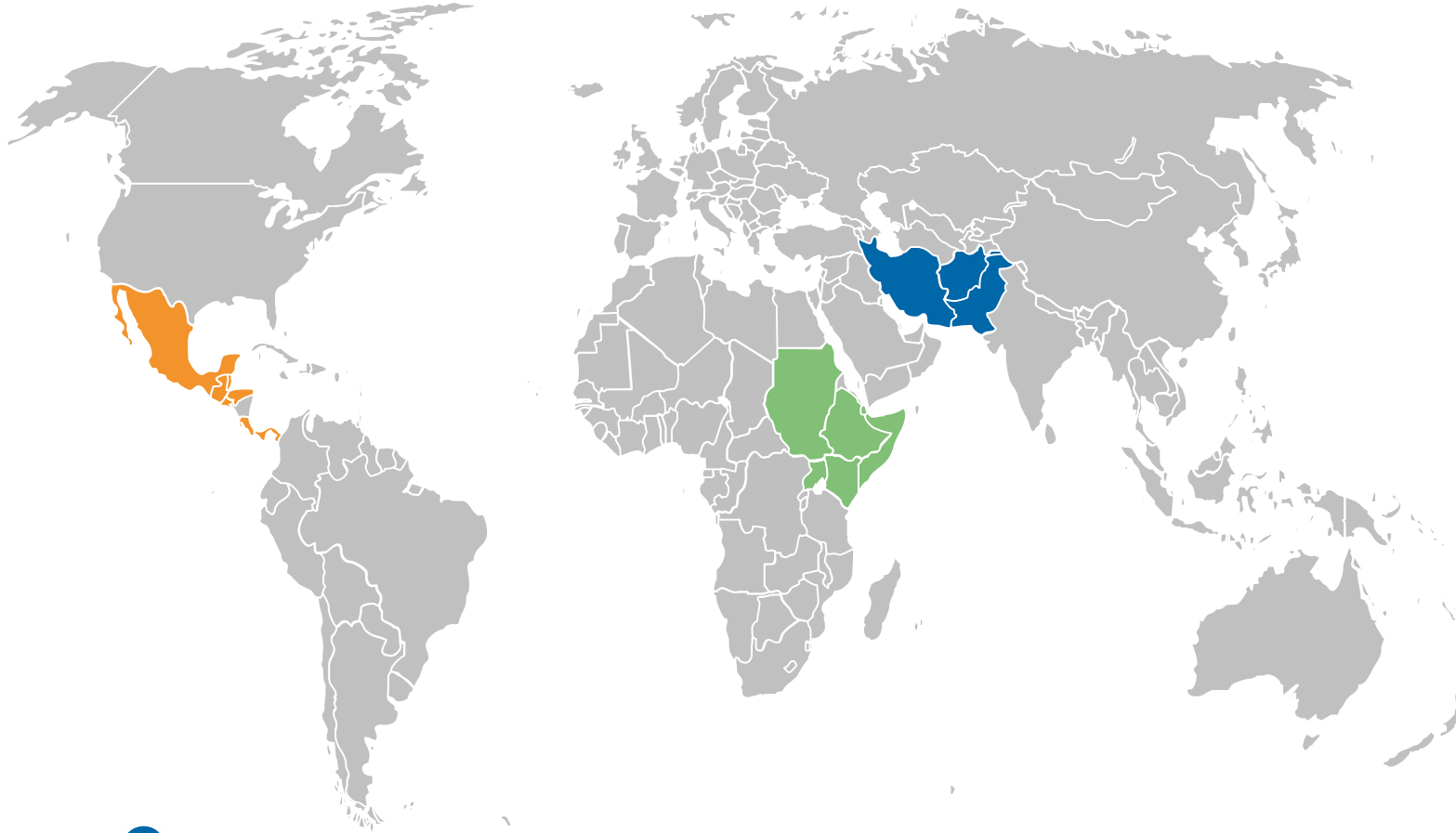


The Global Academic Interdisciplinary Network (GAIN)

- GAIN is called for in the GCR and will support research and teaching on the four GCR objectives
- GAIN will have a secretariat hosted at University of Essex
- Establishing a secretariat for GAIN outside of UNHCR was a top recommendation by both academics and UNHCR staff, which the University of Essex pledged to support at the GRF
- All are welcome to the July virtual signing ceremony on the MoU for the secretariat, where a discussion will take place on how GAIN hopes to support burden and responsibility sharing to 2023

IGAD Support Platform

- Four thematic pillars guide the Platform based on the Nairobi, Djibouti, and Kampala Declarations :
 - Return and Reintegration
 - Education
 - Jobs & Livelihoods, and
 - Health
- The IGAD Support Platform can serve as a vehicle for “matching” of GRF pledges.
- On-going efforts to broaden the base of support, including the engagement of the Inter-Parliamentary Union (IPU)



MIRPS Support Platform

- The MIRPS Support Platform seeks to:
 - 1) Focus attention on the forced displacement situation in Central America and Mexico
 - 2) Leverage support from States, international financial institutions, regional bodies and other stakeholders to further protection and solutions
- Government of Spain to serve as the Chair on a rotational basis for the next 12 months
- The Chair will facilitate a meeting of the Members on 17 June to review the governance structure and an annual workplan



SSAR Support Platform

- Galvanizing additional support for the implementation of the Solutions Strategy for Afghan Refugees
- The 2020 Islamabad Refugee Summit, emphasized renewed joint efforts through a broader base of partnership
- Technical modalities and terms of reference for the Support Platform were developed
- On *6 July*, the High Commissioner and Afghanistan, Iran and Pakistan will formally launch a portfolio of projects to mobilize resources and partnerships
