







### Situation

- Partners reported that requests for humanitarian assistance resulting from lost livelihoods increased with refugees and migrants
  (R&Ms) reaching out mainly for food and rent assistance. The COVID-19 <u>Delta variant increased prevalence</u> in the Sub-region.
   Separately, Caribbean R4V partners collaborated on the RMRP planning process to establish the main priorities and responses to inform the Caribbean RMRP 2022 Chapter.
- In Aruba, the prohibition of flights from Venezuela to the island was extended. Aruban authorities prevented 24 undocumented persons from entering the country. Cases of detention and deportation were also noted by partners. DIMAS tried to catch up on petitions for entries, including requests from Venezuelans, while media reports suggested that some applicants could not get information on their appointments with DIMAS, however, missed appointments would not be re-scheduled for up to three months. Refuting rumours, the Aruban prime minister indicated that the island will not be accepting refugees and asylum-seekers from Afghanistan as the island is already receiving Venezuelans.
- In Curação <u>the Integracion Responsable programme</u> was extended to December 2021 for undocumented R&Ms to regularize their status. On 6 September, seven detained Venezuelans awaiting deportation <u>escaped the Curação an detention center.</u> Two days later, the coastguards intercepted a boat with seven more Venezuelan nationals attempting irregular entry, and subsequently handed them over to the police. Additionally, <u>two Venezuelans were arrested</u> for attempted murder, drugs, and human trafficking during house raids. On <u>11 September, a repatriation flight</u> to Venezuela departed with 78 voluntary returnees and 34 deportees; some R&Ms, however, remained in detention.
- With schools in the **Dominican Republic (DR)** set to re-open for the new schoolyear, COVID-19 protocols for schools were yet to be released. Gaps exist related to children aged 12 and younger who did not receive vaccines, which were only made available to older children. Further, the authorities focussed efforts on reaching host community members and R&Ms with second doses of COVID-19 vaccines, and on third "booster shots", as turn-out rates were low. The aim is to minimize infection rates and the risk of death through campaigns to maintain persons' interest in following through with the vaccination process. Separately, the regularization process for Venezuelans continued with partners supporting through seven information offices countrywide. The next stage, currently being rolled out, will see the delivery of identification cards for all applicants approved for visas, with the anticipated effect of allowing applicants to register with the social security and tax system.
- The Government of **Guyana** has constituted the Multi-Agency Coordinating Committee for addressing the influx of Venezuelans in the country. The national vaccination programme remained accessible to all interested R&Ms. Rising COVID-19 cases and persons not adhering to protocols prompted the authorities to caution against the breach of pandemic measures. Further, shortages of the Sputnik V vaccine resulted in approximately 80,000 persons having to wait for second doses. Additionally, the authorities proposed to better integrate R&Ms into Guyana's workforce, by making the Central Recruitment and Manpower Agency (CRMA) accessible to them and assisting with job placement in safe environments. Further, secondary schools will reopen when all education stakeholders are fully vaccinated. Gaps exist in the availability of data on students (among whom are R&MS), teachers, and other staff who tested positive for COVID-19 following the opening of nursery and primary schools, creating challenges in contact tracing. Separately, CARICOM reiterated their "unwavering support" for Guyana in its border dispute with Venezuela in light of a move by Caracas to strengthen its claim to ownership of the Essequibo region, while Venezuela snubbed Guyana's campaign to use the International Court of Justice to settle the border controversy.
- R4V partners in **Trinidad & Tobago (T&T)** are collaborating to distribute food vouchers and address backlogs of food assistance requests, which continue to grow rapidly as <u>food inflation rates rose by more than 50%</u>. Disproportionately affected R&Ms reached out to partners for rent assistance and support with baby items and cleaning supplies. Partners reported their challenges to conduct in-person distributions due to COVID restrictions, and poor internet service created disruptions in vocational training for R&Ms, preventing in-person graduations and distribution of certificates and food vouchers. Regardless of the economy's phased re-opening, some supplies and materials remain unavailable, delaying workshops' start dates. 34 Venezuelans in irregular status were held by officers on 14 September during an anti-crime exercise.



#### Response



R4V partners in the DR, Curação and Aruba provided R&Ms access to primary and non-emergency health care services not usually accessible to them via the public health system. R&Ms had medical check-ups through an R4V partner, in collaboration with the Aruban Positive Foundation. Mental health and psychosocial needs of R&Ms were addressed in Guyana, Aruba, T&T, and the DR through focused non-specialized and specialized care services, including individual and group support to GBV survivors and remote counselling. In T&T, Venezuelan children accessed in-person paediatric care, while dental care services were provided to R&Ms and host community in Curação, and psychosocial care was given to R&Ms post COVID-19 infection.



In T&T, partners provided food vouchers to victims of trafficking (VOTs), vulnerable R&Ms, and host community. Additionally, R4V partners in Aruba distributed food vouchers to R&M households, while Guyana partners provided multipurpose cash assistance to disproportionately affected R&Ms who qualified for vouchers, to the value of US\$71 or US\$33 to purchase both Food Items (FIs) and Non-Food Items (NFIs). R&Ms received food support from R4V partners in **Curação** with the continued implementation of the nationwide food aid project until the end of September.



Through the Equal Place program, T&T partners provided remote primary and secondary education to R&M children and developed a Content and Language Integrated Learning methodology to teach English as a Second Language (ESL) based on the local curricula. The methodology has accelerated children's ability to improve English proficiency. In Curação, partners donated smart TVs and laptops to schools that cater to Venezuelan children. In Guyana, a partner provided ESL and after-school tutorials to R&Ms in Lethem-Region 9 through the "querer es poder" project from August through September. In Aruba, R&M households received financial support through partners' Back-to-School campaign to offset enrolment costs for the online educational program.



To strengthen MHPSS care and integration support to Venezuelans, Aruban partners embarked on beach cleaning campaign, where Venezuelans and host community came together to facilitate a cleaner, safer environment for their use. R&Ms in T&T graduated from advanced 'Make Up Artistry' and 'Party and Piñata Decorations' courses. Some also received technical and social support to strengthen their livelihood projects in agriculture, animal husbandry, and Warao crafts. R&Ms in Curação visited the charity shop run by an R4V partner and received NFI assistance. In Guyana, R&M women accessed cosmetology training while their children were provided with daycare services.



#### SHELTER

Venezuelan R&Ms in Curação received cash for rent support and in the DR, rental debt payment support from R4V partners to aid with short-term shelter needs. In Guyana, an R4V partner assisted an R&M mother with children who received temporary accommodation at a shelter while another partner provided cash-based assistance to families in need of housing. This allowed them to cover one month's rent and the initial deposit. T&T partners provided multipurpose cash assistance to R&Ms to meet dire needs, as they reported 60% of R&Ms were unable to pay rent while 47% were either evicted or at risk of eviction and 53% could not meet their basic needs.



Venezuelan R&M VoTs in T&T received assistance with biometric registration and resettlement to ensure legal protection. In Curação, VoTs and GBV survivors received psychosocial care, and hygiene kits were distributed for sex workers. Additionally, R4V partners provided legal assistance on labour rights, migratory and asylum procedures in the DR, T&T, and Aruba, focusing on R&Ms at-risk of GBV, or those at-risk of deportation. In Guyana and Aruba, GBV prevention and response, advocacy activities and identification, and referral of R&M child protection cases to relevant public service providers were delivered to R&Ms. Partners also provided case management services. In Aruba, multi-sectoral protection assessments were carried out by partners to identify risks and gaps, as well as monitor R&Ms situation.
