## Protection Cluster Meeting – Minutes September 19, 2019

Updates on the Coordination meeting conducted in Dondo on September 18	<ul> <li>On September 18, UNHCR and DPGCAS led a coordination meeting in Dondo, which has been attended by various organizations ((WFP, IOM, HelpAge, UNFPA, IFRC, UNICEF and PRM) and local authorities. The meeting was held to strengthen the coordination of protection activities at district level and the main recommendations are:         <ol> <li>In general, meetings in Dondo have been held sporadically and separately in the three resettlement neighborhoods (Mandruzi, Mutua and Savane). In addition, there is no leadership from a local authority to convene and facilitate the meeting, leading to coordination and referral issues. Thus, it is suggested that local authorities from DPGCAS lead weekly coordination meetings, sharing every week the minutes with the problems identified with the Provincial Protection Cluster.</li> <li>Meetings should be divided into thematic points (shelter, WASH, health, education, protection, safety, etc.) to discuss collective problems and possible solutions at local and district level.</li> <li>Organizations participating in the Provincial Protection Cluster meetings in Beira should establish internal mechanisms to</li> </ol> </li> </ul>	<ol> <li>DPGCAS will require district authorities to send the minutes of coordination meetings to the Provincial Protection Cluster in Beira every Monday.</li> <li>DPGCAS will ensure that Provincial Protection Cluster minutes are shared with district and local authorities.</li> </ol>

	should hold coordination meetings in the Districts periodically (at least	
	once a month) to further strengthen the coordination and

	UNHCR emphasizes that the next steps will be critical. In October, another 3	
	weekly meetings will be held again in Dondo, Nhamatanda and Buzi. Following	
	this second round of meetings, district representatives will be invited to attend	
	the Protection Cluster meeting in Beira in the last week of October to receive a	
	training session on coordination tools.	
	DPGCAS emphasizes the importance of bringing to the local level studies and	
	surveys such as the Feedback Mechanism Survey presented by the CEWG in	
	Dondo. Therefore, partners should keep in mind that it is important to share	
	these studies locally.	
	SCCP (UNICEF) reported on the meeting held last Tuesday by the case	
	management task force and the need to strengthen the link with the SC GBV	
	on common issues such as early marriage.	
	SCCP advises that, with regard to case management, it is important to keep	
	updating the mapping of available services by resettlement neighborhood to	
	ensure appropriate referrals are done.

	age. If there are people with disabilities within this criterion, they are identified by the activists and kits are brought to them. People with disabilities are prioritized.	
	<ul> <li>UNHCR asks if partners have data on the number of people with disabilities in resettlement neighborhoods.</li> </ul>	
	<ul> <li>FAMOD reports that there are indeed difficulties in mapping the number of people with disabilities in resettlement neighborhoods.</li> </ul>	
	<ul> <li>UNHCR emphasizes the importance of having a quantitative survey of persons with disabilities. This would facilitate their inclusion and would enable organizations to include them into their community-based teams.</li> </ul>	
	<ul> <li>FAMOD informs that there is a lack of resources to conduct such surveys and that a platform is needed to allow partners to work jointly. UNHCR points out that the DWG should be this platform.</li> </ul>	
	<ul> <li>DPGCAS reports that activists in Guara Guara and Bandua in Buzi already have data on people with disabilities - just over 300 people. Hence one should leverage existing data.</li> </ul>	
	<ul> <li>FAMOD reports that there are different approaches in psychosocial support programs. Thus, information and assistance would need to be standardized.</li> </ul>	
	UNFPA reports that it continues to support DPGCAS in developing its quarterly work plan.	
	<ul> <li>HI is supporting LFTW to map services available to people with disabilities in Sofala, both in resettlement neighborhoods and communities.</li> </ul>	
Updates from the	<ul> <li>HI will conduct a WASH assessment in Dondo, Nhamatanda, Buzi and Chibabava focusing on people with disabilities and elderly people.</li> </ul>	
members of the Protection Cluster	<ul> <li>UNHCR informs that it is finalizing the distribution of NFIs in Sofala. From September 20 to 21, it will distribute the last 4,000 items to about 300 families in Maxquil Alto 2 and Mussocossa and the Bea community in Buzi.</li> </ul>	
	<ul> <li>IFRC received training on 10-11 September, facilitated by the LFTW, on people with disabilities' inclusion. Their teams will start working with identification of persons with disability.</li> </ul>	
	<ul> <li>SCI will distribute next week NFIs for children in Dondo, Nhamatanda and Buzi. It will also distribute toys and other materials to be placed in CFSs.</li> </ul>	

	<ul> <li>UNHCR asks whether all resettlement neighborhoods have family latrines and access to water.</li> <li>UNICEF reports that there is access to water, but family latrines are not present in all locations.</li> </ul>	
Update on the new per diem rates for government officials on missions	<ul> <li>DPGCAS reports that, according to the new policy, for distances over 40km where mission participants must stay overnight, MZN 6000 will be due per day.</li> <li>If the mission comes and goes the same day, 30% of the MZN 6000 have to be paid.</li> <li>Explanations were not clear and many questions arose.
