

## Overview

The Anti Trafficking Task Team, established under the Global Protection Cluster, held an Anti-Trafficking workshop in Juba from 30 September to 1 October 2019 – with the support of the IOM and UNHCR. The objective of the workshop was to create awareness on what trafficking in persons is, be introduced to the anti-trafficking tools developed by the Task Team and to deliberate on possible interventions that can be pursued in South Sudan in terms of trafficking in humanitarian emergencies. The workshop concluded that trafficking is a matter of concern in South Sudan, and anti-trafficking initiatives need to be integrated in all humanitarian responses, and that mapping of possible areas of immediate intervention be undertaken. The coordination mechanism for the anti-trafficking task force in South Sudan will continue to be led by the Protection Cluster under the Global Protection Cluster with support from IOM and UNHCR for the time being.

## Housing, Land, and Property Technical Working Group (HLP TWG)

On the 27 September, the HLP TWG held a retreat with HLP partners to discuss HLP activities, challenges and best practices. The retreat also served an opportunity for HLP partners to discuss prevailing protection needs related to HLP as well as a platform for planning for the coming year. The retreat was timely as it was the first that was held after 9 months since the inception of the TWG. Cognizant the evolving displacement situation in South Sudan—which includes increased IDP returns and the identification of refugees in several areas—the need for equitable and durable HLP solutions is increasingly critical. The retreat therefore served the opportunity to review the TWG’s progress and challenges in meeting current HLP-related demands and planning for the future. In 2019, significant strides have been made towards HLP programming with focus on women HLP, security of tenure, access to legal documentation and legal assistance forming the core of programming in priority locations such as Wau, Yei, Torit, Bentiu and Bor South. Integrated programming with partners providing shelter rehabilitation and construction has seen vulnerable returnee populations pursue transitional solutions in light of their return to places of habitual residence.

## Mobile Protection Coordination Forum

The Mobile Protection Coordination Forum (MPCF) continues to provide a platform for coordination of all protection mobile responses primarily for the Integrated Protection Mobile Teams (IPMT), Emergency Preparedness & Response (EP&R), Rapid Response Mission (RRM) and the standard Mobile Teams. In the month of September, two missions planned to Yiroi East and Waat. Based on IPC trends and flooding in these locations. Due to the unrepresented rainfall over the past months, displacements have been recorded as a result of flooding. The Protection Cluster will continue monitor areas hosting returnees in the month of October.

## Monitoring and Evaluation (M&E)

Briefing on progress of implementation was conducted with nine partner organizations (5 NNGOs and 4 INGOs) implementing SSHF SA 2. A question and answer session was conducted and OCHA representatives also participated in providing clarity on SSHF monitoring and reporting expectations. The briefing included general protection, HLP and IPMT with the sub clusters still to organize separate briefings.

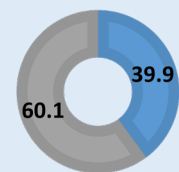

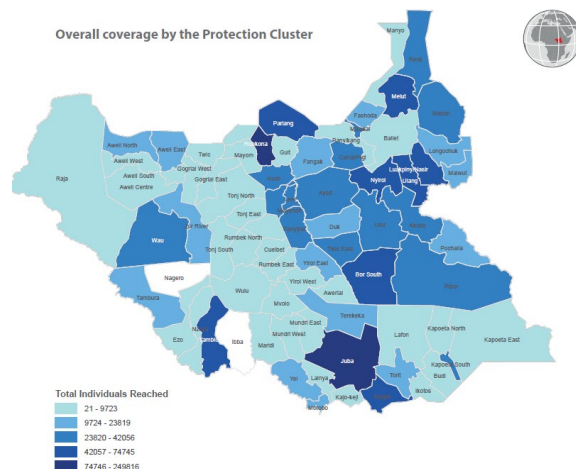

## Child Protection Sub Cluster

### Launch of the Facilitators Manual for Psychosocial Support (PSS) Activities and the Practical Guide for the Socio-Economic Reintegration of Girls Formerly Associated with armed forces and groups in South Sudan.

UNICEF in collaboration with the Child Protection Area of Responsibility and the Ministry of Gender, Child and Social Affairs officially launched the **Practical Guide for the Socio-Economic Reintegration of Girls Formerly Associated in South Sudan** as well as the **Facilitator's Manual for Psychosocial Support Activities in Child-Friendly Spaces, Schools and Communities** and the accompanying Trainer's Guide on 26 September 2019 in Juba, South Sudan. The above Child Protection documents which is developed specifically for the South Sudan context, is aimed at improving the quality of Psychosocial Support and reintegration programming in South Sudan. The launch event was attended by various government officials, Donors, UN agencies, Child Protection sub-cluster members, as well as implementing UNICEF partners and the media.

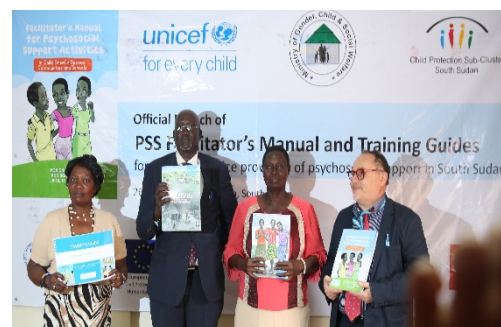

## Capacity Building of teachers on Psychosocial support & Psychological First Aid

Plan International conducted 3 -days training on Psychosocial Support (PSS) and Psychological First Aid (PSS /PFA) in Gumuruk, Pibor County. This training is part of an effort to strengthen the capacity of the teachers in delivering quality PSS to psychosocially distressed children in schools. School-based PSS is one of the most effective ways to support children's education and improve their wellbeing. A total of 20 teachers (13 M and 7 F) were trained on structured PSS and PFA packages.

## EVD Psychosocial Support Preparedness Workshop

As part of the Ebola Virus Diseases (EVD) response plan, the CPSC sub cluster and the PSS Technical working group members participated in the EVD- PSS preparedness workshop on 27 September 2019 at UNICEF offices in Juba. The workshop reviewed and discussed key PSS preparedness activities as part of the national response plan. With support from the Global PSS Area of Responsibility, the workshop participants agreed on the need to develop a contextualized training package for PSS -aligned to the guidance note on protection of children during infectious disease outbreaks.

## Mine Action Sub Cluster

### Explosive Ordnance-related Incidents

On 28 September 2019, one explosive remnant of war (ERW) related accident occurred in Rajaf, Central Equatoria. A four-year-old girl and a seven-year-old boy were playing with a hand grenade and sustained injuries above their knees and damage to their hearing from the explosion. A new hazardous area (HA) will be opened for further investigation as the area was formally Sudanese Armed Forces (SAF) Barracks.

### Support for Humanitarian Actors

In September, the International Organization for Migration (IOM) reported an ERW near the UNMISS Field Office in Malakal, Upper Nile. EWR ordainment was safely removed and destroyed.

### Workshops

With the generous support from the Government of Japan and UNMAS, the Mine Advisory Group (MAG) commenced a Resource Mobilization Workshop in Juba on 30 September. Participants included personnel from the National Mine Action Authority (NMAA) and national Mine Action non-governmental organizations (NGOs). The Ambassador of Japan in South Sudan, H.E. Mr. Seiji Okada, provided opening remarks at the workshop, applauding the efforts of the NMAA and the national NGOs on making substantial progress toward a mine free country. MAG will be conducting two more trainings/workshops for national mine action partners. A workshop on Project Management (including narrative and financial reporting) will be held 21 October to 25 October, as well as a workshop on Mine Risk Education Training of Trainers will be held 28 October to 1 November.



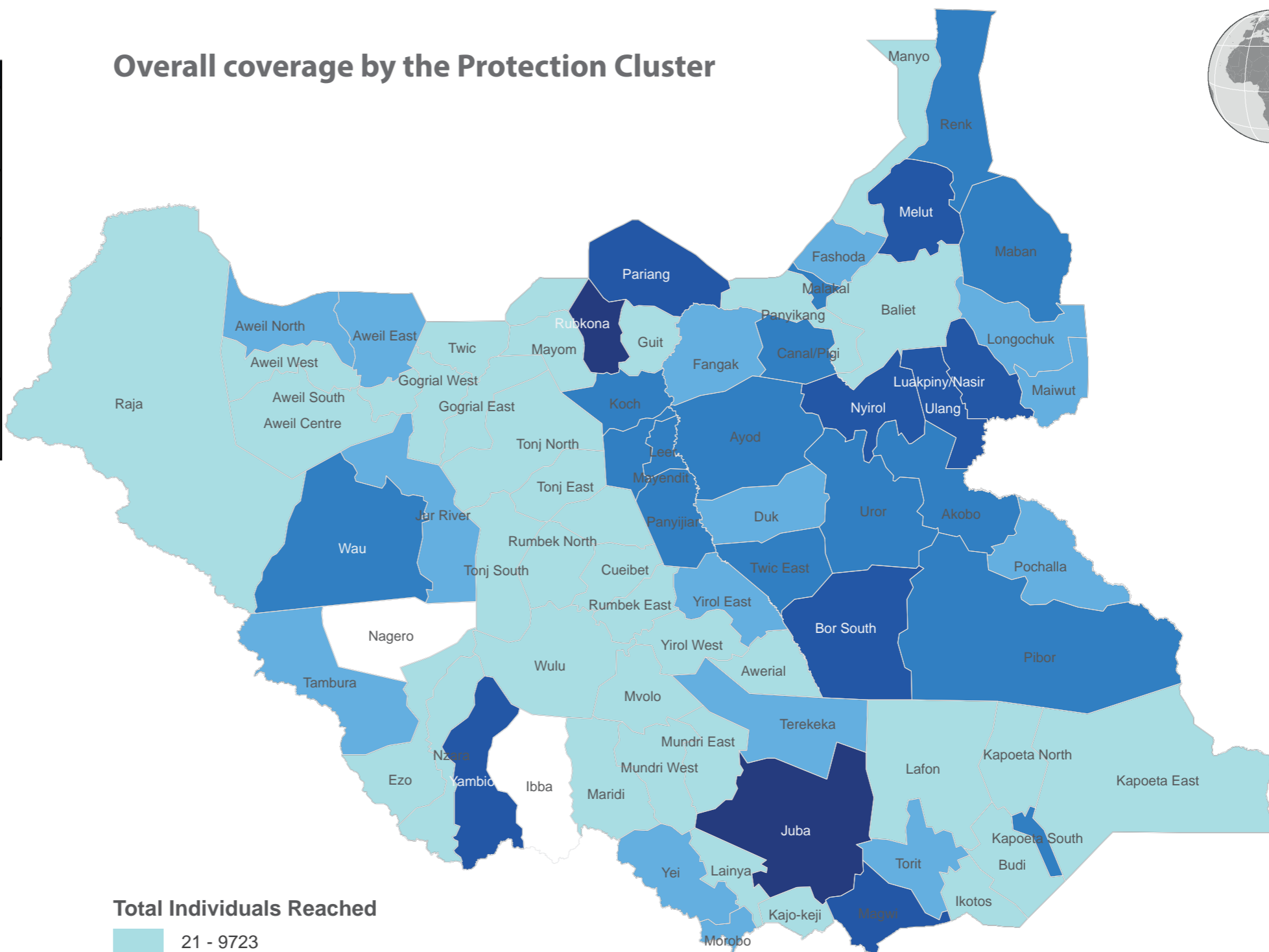
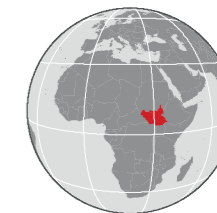

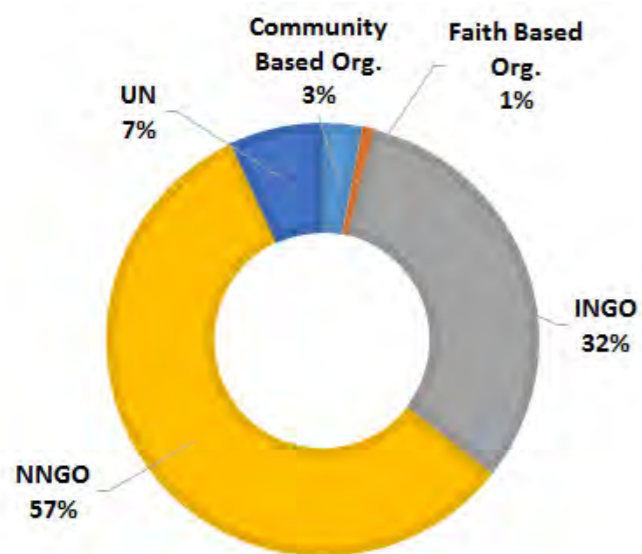

### Overall coverage by the Protection Cluster

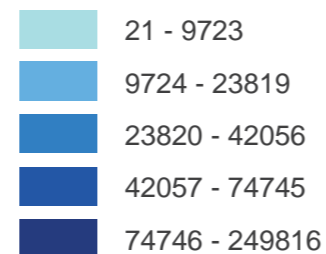

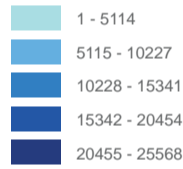

% reached by gender

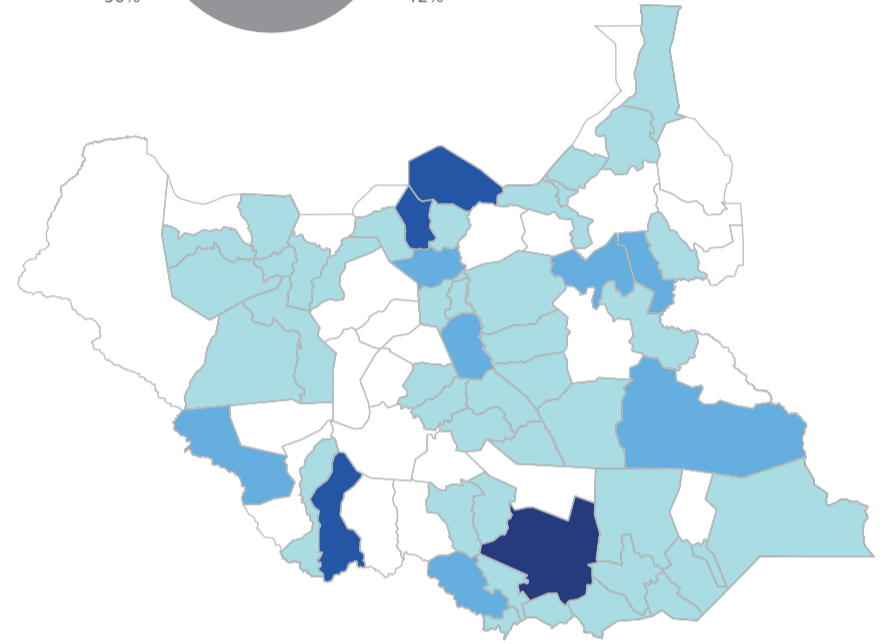
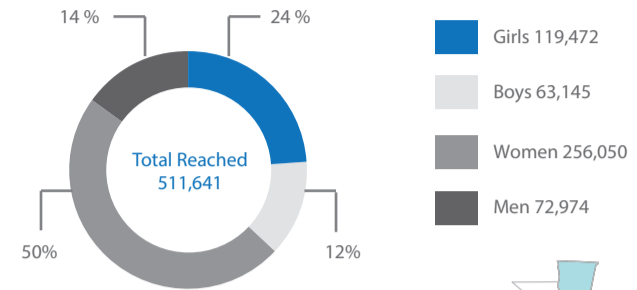

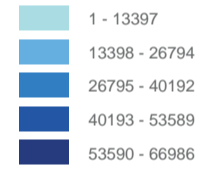


## Gender Based Violence

% reached by gender and age group

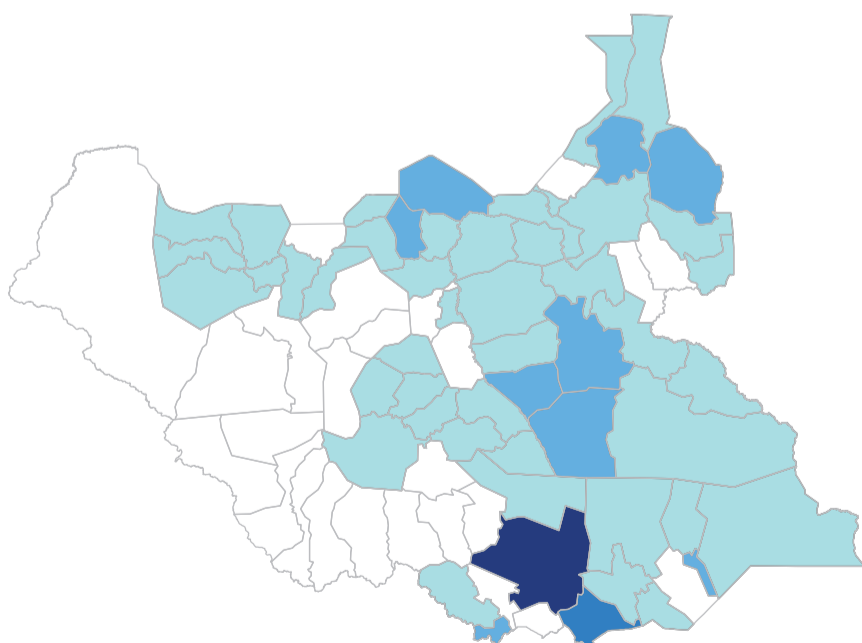
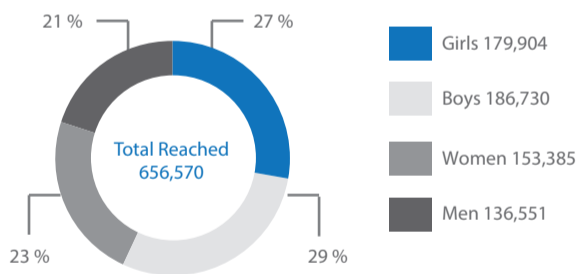

% reached by gender and age group

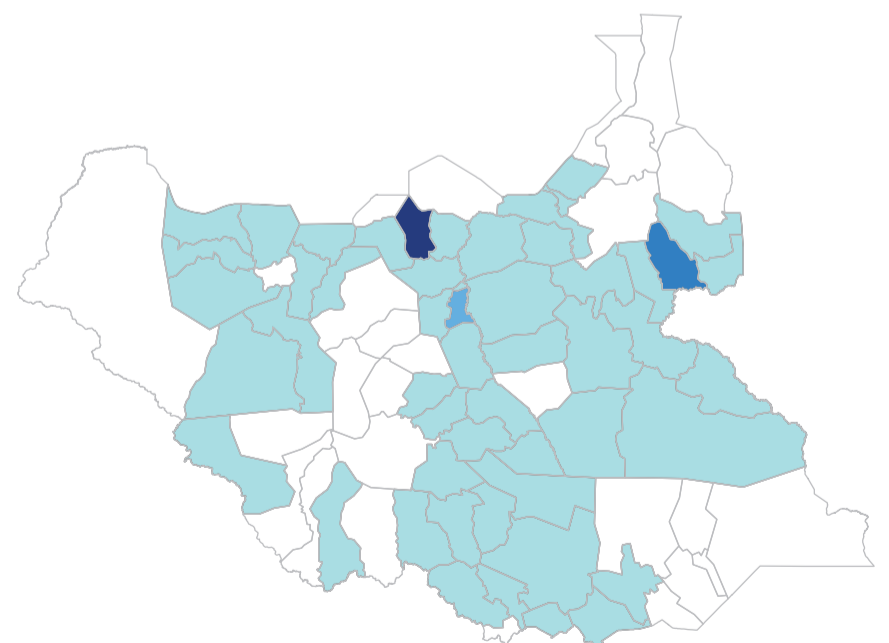
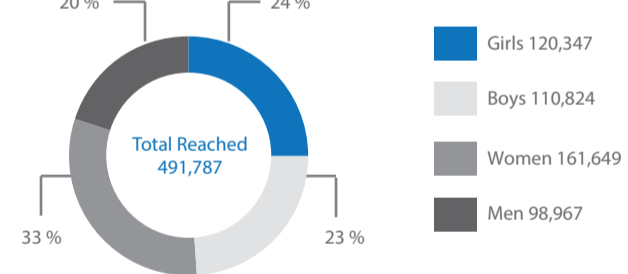

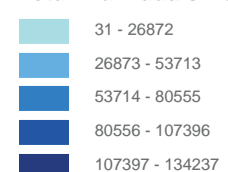

% reached by gender and age group

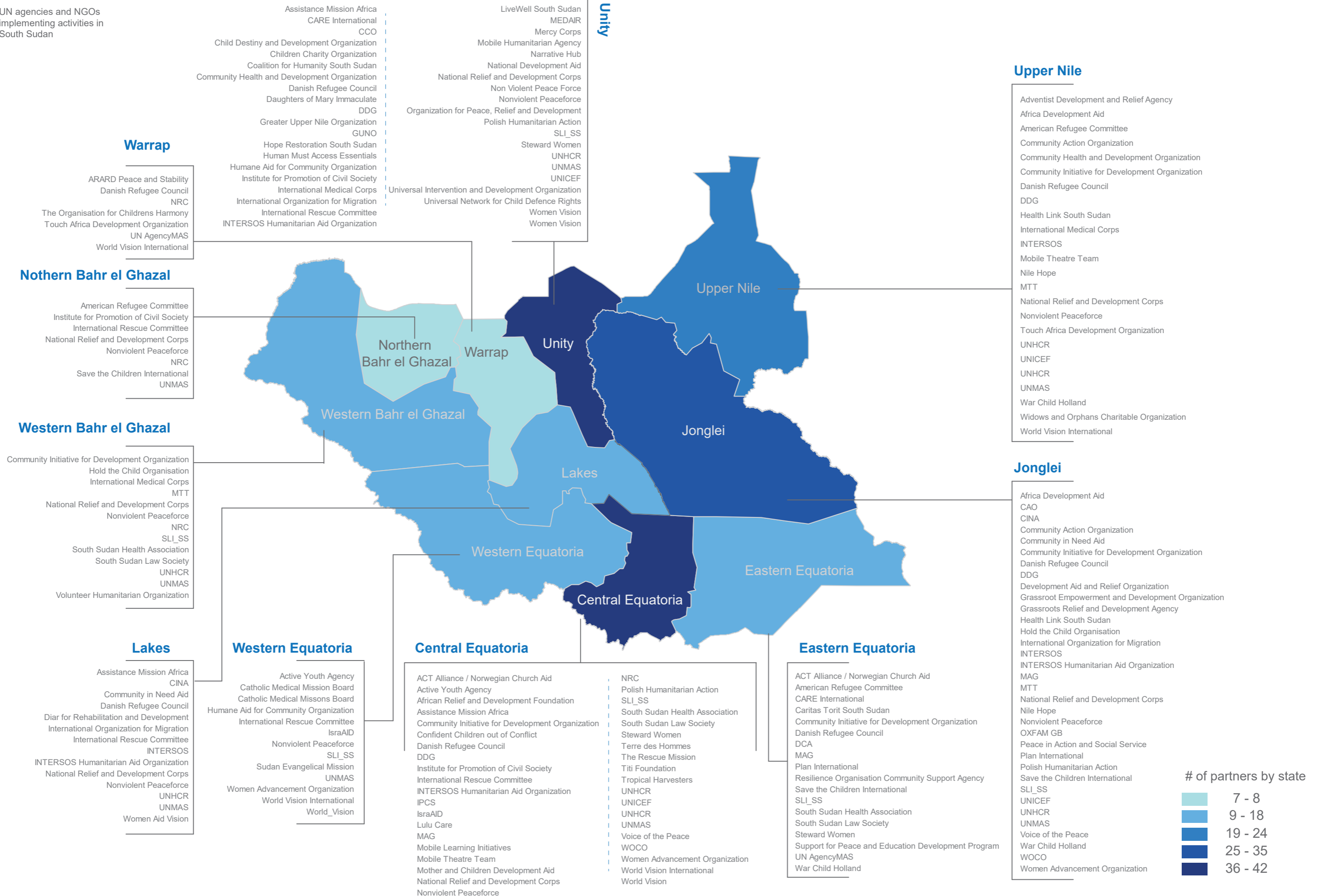
