	0	Chair noted there will be a 'verification brainstorming' session in the morning whereby		
		agencies are expected to come together and determine what a verification exercise		
		would look like and what each sector would need – if it got the go ahead.		
	0	OAG raised the question on whether this exercise would be able to quantify how many		
		kids are not in school? Chair confirmed this is exactly the type of information we hope to		
		garner from such an exercise, because there is currently a gap.		
	0	SS updated that MOE have processed 1,500 students and are ready to provide them with		
		letters once their parents produce NIB or identification. This allows them to go to school,		
		as all kids have to be to school. Approximately 900 letters have been distributed so far,		
		with 500 not collected amongst those pending/not collected. 150 letters are being		
		withheld because parents have no ID. Query from the floor how parents can provide		
		documentation if they have no legal status or lost documents, it is not possible.		
	0	Moreover, despite the letter, some schools are still not letting the kids attend because		
		they don't have space/teachers, etc. There was a question on the actual document		
		required from MOE, to which SS confirmed MOE would need to answer that. Chair		
		mentioned that catch up classes in the interim were likely to be solution if it could be		
		raised at the appropriate level.

	 IFRC questioned whether re: tent cities, has there been consideration of where children will go to school? SS was not sure, but noted that teachers have been reaching out to prepare classes. It was noted that as per media all the schools won't be open until 2020.

3W, Activities Tracking & Referral	 IM support noted they been working with DTID to revise existing 3w, and this week they will be training colleagues on a new system on indicators. The have been migrating from previous systems and while there are openings for additional indicators, the number of indicators are restricted and the whole process must be simplified. IM support noted the global working group provides reports that guide what to report in certain time frames – and noted that this might be the future going forward, but for the moment, the focus will be on weekly reporting at the moment ESF5 in Abaco participated for the first time there is the need for training asap, which could take place as early as next week
Documentation	 OAG noted the question of what will happen with death certificates has not been decided. OAG also updated the Eugene Dupuch law School is currently keeping a low profile given the number of cases they are working on - 162 children of whom they are trying to document. They are mainly working with children's homes to replace birth certificate and NIB. As they currently were overwhelmed there was thus a gap in supporting children's replacement documentation which could be shared with donors. UNHCR noted the significant costs associated with replacing documentation, in some cases (depending on context) exceeding 900 USD. Noting that these costs were significant in the absence of a workable waiver, it was noted that details of the waiver remain elusive.

Psychosocial/ Mental health	 MOH noted there was no timetable from Bahamas Psychological Association on when they will have sessions at the govt. clinic but there were currently conducting clinics at doctors hospitals and the national art gallery (in addition to the shelters) In GB they are also working, MOH is working on a two year strategy with CRS to support services there. No update available for Abaco. OAG mentioned there was also the Seahorse institute working with people who in the shelters, and in the past week there were concerns regarding suicidal thoughts coming from those in the shelters. SS raised the point that people should be aware with messages they receive since they weekend they observed message indicating there was no food and water at a shelter, but upon verification by SS, this was found not to be true. 		
Human Rights	 Chair clarified that the position of the UNOHCHR which appeared in news media this week, highlighting that while the State is sovereign and thus have right to carry out certain functions, the same must be done in accordance with be due process Noting that the advocacy is from the UN vis-a-vis the verification is to include statelessness persons in order to safeguard their rights to nationality rights in the future. Notwithstanding, there is the need to differentiate the groups OAG noted that deportation is a legal process, so people would have the opportunity to raise issues/questions, however, the Chair noted there were questions surrounding certain incidents, because in some cases for example, deportees claimed they had legal documents, but did not have the opportunity to retrieve the same.

Child Protection	0	IFRC raised the issue of the lack of background check on volunteers coming in to shelters and overall. Suggested the Govt. may wish to consider including this protocol going forward as there is no legal framework on volunteers. Chair noted that there are good examples of how volunteer programmes can be managed from Greek situation (contact Yasmine)		



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0	MOH noted that people should go through the correct channels, i.e. register with NEMA,
	whereas IOM flagged again the good practices from Greece, and that education is key
	because people need to understand why there are rules around this.

- Chair noted that confidentiality agreements and code of conduct are two critical components should be included from the outset.
- MOH noted that in health EMTs and independent volunteers sign a waiver and confidentiality form, to which the Chair noted that perhaps health is probably the only one agency that has done this.
- Chair introduced the concept of PSAE and noted the online training should be completed by all.
