Psychosocial/	0	Chair updated on the situation in Abaco, regarding the immigration exercises which are	
Mental health		exacerbating psychosocial issues amongst the affected the population, and even the	
		identification of those people is now becoming a protection issue. PSS concerns have	
		increased. People are staying overnight in a church with the lights out of fear that once lights are out, immigration will raid them.	
		IOM noted that department of immigration is conducting raids at night and it is further	
	0	traumatizing an already traumatized community who are now living in fear – including	
		amongst evacuees.	
		Noted that people have been picked up and sent back to Haiti, and there was a mention	
		of an individual case reported in the media, where a family from Abaco went out of	
		collective shelter to go to local restaurant (father is on a work permit, mother children	
		are not) and the latter was detained by immigration.	
	0	MOH indicated they were sending psychiatrists and psychologists to Abaco for the	
		response, and they are still waiting on Catholic Relief Services (CRS) to start in Grand	
		Bahama.	



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	MOH further noted that they are building the relationship with Red Cross and the mental
	health nurses working with them on PSS efforts to get a better understanding of their
	outreach.
	o It was highlighted that with the concern over immigration that a more effective response
	is needed to ensure patients in need can access public helath care and psychosocial
	response as without which their mental health could significantly deteroriate
luman Rights	o The most recent detention figures were shared as of the 29 October which stood at 187
	persons (inclusive of 2 persons in the safe-house).
	The issue of abuse allegations by Immigration Officer was raised and it was noted that
	the allegations were also brought to the attention of the Attorney General. The AG
	noted that any such allegations should be reported and investigated. However there is
	the fear by victims of retribution and therefore they will not come forward.
	OHCHR noted that in the current climate one cannot be expected to come forward and
	report abuse and torture, because there is no guarantee of justice nor transparency and
	accountability of how the same will be investigated. Therefore it is preferable for the AG
	to develop and publish clear policies and procedures in a transparent and accountable
	manner to encourage people to report cases. Noting the due process, access to
	independent legal counsel and other guarantees are not clear, OHCHR noted there is no
	trust in a system that is discriminating against people of Haitian origin.
	 Chair highlighted that screening for those at risk of statelessness as part of the
	verification process– from protection perspective –would be a safeguard if people are in
	the process, but in the absence of verification, they are risk of being picked up.
	 OHCHR will be in Nassau on 10th for one week, and the RC a.i. will join for 2 days. Both
	will write to MoFA requesting a follow up meeting, and will try to organize with all
	relevant ministries to respond to our concerns on protection.
	 Chair suggested that RC meet with the PSWG on 10th November to provide feedback on
	her meetings

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	 Americares asked whether the RC and OHCHR will come to the shelter. OHCHR
	indicated that they will try to visit Abaco and the shelters and also the Detention Centre,
	but this also depends on answers from the Government.
	o IOM noted that with respect to deportations, some people were deported to Cape Haiti
	where there is no assistance or reintegration possibility there. According to the families
	of people deported there, immigration purchased the tickets on their behalf, even
	though those individuals do not originate from there and have no family there. Five of
	those claimed to be abused.
	Concerning the 17 deported on the weekend, OHCHR enquired whether IOM or the
	Haitian embassy had any updates on their situation and that it would be good to find out.

Communication	Chair updated that hopefully there will be a response from Mr. Cargill before the end of
with	the week with respect to the FAQs compilation sent to him last week.
Communities	 MOH will follow up on their side and are waiting for some responses to be submitted.
	There was also a question of how frequently they are to be updated, since some of the responses may change.
	 Chair noted the offer on the table for publishing same however will depend on if the
	FAQs need to be updated regularly, but for those answers that will invariably change,
	they do not need to be put in print form but can share via whats app.
	o IOM noted once we have the first round of information we can start with that.
GBV/PSEA	WFP PSEA FP noted that he was developing a context specific, sector specific roll out of
	the PSEA and that he would be asking for nominations (by sector) for focal points.
	The priority is to train whichever locals or internationals who will remain on the ground.
	It is ½ day training, how to identify risks and how to report.
	CEF are interested in joining the training and can act as FP for the PSWG



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	MOH – requested pertinent details for the training: profile of person needed, time frame
	for training, expectations, etc.
	Chair recommends training the focal points and then getting them to recommend
	appropriate contacts for the formation of a taskforce
	MOH – PSEA – how does it correlate to trafficking? FPA, GBV coordinator doing TIP
	training. Chair explained the objective of the PSEA, noting its particular relevance in the
	context of hidden population, who are afraid to go to the authorities.
	MOH – who will support the individual? NGOs? If so where will they be getting their info
	for that support? Committed to sharing a single access hotline, but still have to figure
	how it ties in with existing hotlines
	Chair noted we need to identify which NOGS and other will be most appropriate to make
	the referral.
	 FWP noted the training would be in the coming week for protection, GBV, Shelter,
	Health, mental health livelihood, food security and cash working ground – which will be
	broken into three training groups.
	 Chair recommend to first offer the broader training, then identify those for task force
	because people are based on three islands and needs to be replicated in all locations.
	 FPA – will share TORs with the managers as well as potential dates
	·
Child Protection	A new education person has arrived to replace Lisa but there are still gaps in child
	protection and no update on UAM numbers, still gaps in education registration, and still
	gaps for specifics of those out of school. That said, classes are starting in the love tents
	for those not registered in school, and that is a positive pragmatic approach.
	CEF updated that they started classes this morning with 50 kids. Will offer classes twice a
	week on Tuesday and Thursday. This morning they also had 3 parent volunteers.
	Kids were mostly 4-15 years old, most challenged with reading, and numeracy, so they
	are working on a plan moving forward.
	Chair informed that the AGs office raised with access to education issue with the Ministry
	of Education, but no response as yet
