Human rights defender from Ukraine was denied entry to Belarus - BLR 005 / 0411 / OBS 067

The Observatory for the Protection of Human Rights Defenders, a joint programme of the International Federation for Human Rights (FIDH) and the World Organisation Against Torture (OMCT), requests your intervention in the following situation in Belarus.

Description of the situation:

The Observatory has been informed by reliable sources of the denial of Ms. **Marina Tsapok**, a Ukrainian citizen member of the International Observation Mission in Minsk and coordinator of the work of the Kyiv Informational Center of the Committee on International Control over the Human Rights Situation in Belarus [1], to enter the territory of Belarus.

According to the information received, on April 20, 2011 around 4 a.m., Ms. Marina Tsapok was stopped at the "Teryukha" frontier post of the Ukrainian-Belarus border and taken off the train, as she was on her way to Minsk. The border police officer explained to her that she was denied entry to Belarus, but he did not specify the reasons of that denial, and no written document was handed to Ms. Tsapok. She was expelled back to Kiev with the 7 a.m. morning train.

The Observatory recalls that Ukrainian citizens do not need a visa to enter Belarus.

The Observatory therefore fears that such obstacles to freedom of movement - already posed in March 2011 against Mr. **Maxim Kitsyuk**, a Ukrainian citizen, representative of the International Observation Mission, and to Mr. **Andrey Yurov**, a Russian citizen, Head of the Committee on International Control over the Situation with Human Rights in Belarus [2] - merely seem to aim at sanctioning human rights activities carried out in the framework of the Committee on International Control over the Situation with Human Rights in Belarus.

The Observatory calls on Belarus to conform to Article 13 of the International Covenant on Civil and Political Rights (ICCPR) to which Belarus is a party since November 12, 1973 and establishes that "An alien lawfully in the territory of a State Party to the Covenant may be expelled therefrom only in pursuance of a decision reached in accordance with law [...]", as well as to the United Nations Declaration on Human Rights Defenders adopted by the UN General Assembly on December 9, 1998.

Actions requested:

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The Observatory urges the authorities of Belarus to:

- i. Put an end to the obstacles to freedom of movement of Ms. Marina Tsapok, as they seem to merely aim at sanctioning their human rights activities;
- iii. Put an end to all forms of harassment against the above-mentioned human rights defenders, and more generally against all human rights defenders in the country or entering the country, and ensure that they are able to carry out their work freely without any hindrances in all circumstances;
- iv. Comply with all the provisions of the ICCPR and in particular its Article 13 which states that "An alien lawfully in the territory of a State Party to the present Covenant may be expelled there from only in pursuance of a decision reached in accordance with law and shall, except where compelling reasons of national security otherwise require, be allowed to submit the reasons against his expulsion and to have his case reviewed by, and be represented for the purpose before, the competent authority or a person or persons especially designated by the competent authority."
- v. Comply with all the provisions of the United Nations Declaration on Human Rights Defenders, in particular with:
- its Article 1, which provides that "everyone has the right, individually and in association with others, to promote
 and to strive for the protection and realization of human rights and fundamental freedoms at the national and
 international levels",
- its Article 12.2, which states that "the State shall take all necessary measures to ensure the protection by the competent authorities of everyone, individually and in association with others, against any violence, threats, retaliation, de facto or de jure adverse discrimination, pressure or any other arbitrary action as a consequence of his or her legitimate exercise of the rights referred to in the present Declaration";
- vi. Comply with the provisions of the Document of the Copenhagen Meeting of the 2nd Conference on the Human Dimension of the Cooperation and Security Conference in Europe (CSCE) (1990), and uphold in all circumstances the principles and provisions enshrined in the international and regional human rights instruments ratified by Belarus and which, in particular, guarantee freedoms of association, demonstration, expression and opinion, in particular the European Convention on Human Rights and the International Covenant on Civil and Political Rights;
- vii. More generally, ensure in all circumstances the respect for human rights and fundamental freedoms in accordance with the Universal Declaration of Human Rights and with international and regional human rights instruments ratified by Belarus.

[1] On December 27, 2010 the Committee on International Control over the Human Rights Situation in Belarus was established by a coalition of non-governmental organisations of the OSCE region. It was triggered by the need to address flagrant and systematic human rights violations after Presidential elections in Belarus. It demands, inter alia, freedom from torture and cruel, inhuman or degrading treatment, the right to fair trial, freedom of assembly and association, and freedom of speech. It is engaged in monitoring and controlling over the observation of fundamental human rights, and the conditions in which human rights defenders and human rights organisations operate in the country.
