It has been four months since the beginning of Russia's full-scale war against Ukraine. Over the weekend, intense airstrikes and missile attacks hit multiple oblasts in various parts of Ukraine, including in the capital, causing destruction, civilian injuries and deaths. The fierce fighting continues in eastern Ukraine, and humanitarian needs in the country are enormous and continue growing.

UNHCR has continued to **expand the scale and reach of programmes**, with the aim of delivering assistance and services as close as possible to the place where people are sheltering or have been displaced. UNHCR's response has now reached more than **1.5 million people** with protection services, assistance through cash or essential items, and shelter support to repair or protect their damaged homes from the elements.

UNHCR operates as part of the inter-agency emergency response and is leading three clusters - **Protection, Shelter and NFIs** (non-food items), and **CCCM** (Camp Coordination and Camp Management).

While providing immediate relief to those fleeing, UNHCR is also working closely with local and national actors to lay the groundwork for **sustainable and durable solutions** and ensure that our response is aligned with social programmes thus effectively reinforcing and complementing national systems.

The longer the war continues, the **medium to longer-term needs that conflict-affected people, IDPs, and returnees will face to rebuild their lives** will similarly rise and require sustained support from the humanitarian and broader international community.

KEY RESPONSE FIGURES

A total of **1.5 M people** reached with assistance to date.



369,900 people received **targeted protection assistance and information** at border points, transit, and reception centres and through hotlines.



536,595 individuals enrolled to receive **cash assistance** and **366,262** individuals received their payments.



571,099 people received **essential items, clothes, shelter materials and food assistance**.



99,350 people have received assistance through **95** humanitarian convoys delivered to **hard-hit areas**.



72,717 sleeping places created/improved in a total of **196** reception & collective centres.

WEEKLY HIGHLIGHTS: Protection Response

- Since the beginning of the emergency, UNHCR and its NGO partners have provided legal consultations to more than 26,000 people, legal assistance to more than 18,000 people, social accompaniment to nearly 9,000 people and protection counselling and information to more than 151,000 people.
- Since 24 February, UNHCR's NGO partners have provided psychosocial support to almost 36,000 people.
- Last week, the Government Commissioner for the Rights of Persons with Disabilities, Tetiana Barantsova, together with UNHCR and its NGO partners conducted a series of joint visits in Zakarpatska oblast, to centres and organizations providing accommodation or rehabilitation services to internally displaced persons with disabilities, including children, as well as centres accommodating Roma IDPs. Participants assessed accessibility of the institutions and the needs of IDPs with disabilities evacuated from the eastern Ukraine.
- UNHCR and its NGO partners also continue monitoring protection needs at border points, transit, reception and collective centres as well as in communities, and proposed interventions to address them. More than 4,000 monitoring missions were conducted since the beginning of the emergency. The needs vary from NFIs and food provisions to psychological assistance, social consultations and referrals.
- UNHCR's NGO partners organized recreational activities for IDP families. Nehemia prepared indoor and outdoor activities for more than 100 children in Uzhhorod, NEEKA organized two historical guided tours for 30 IDPs in Mukachevo, while CrimeaSOS jointly with local NGOs and representatives of local authorities organized games, sports competitions, and creative activities for IDP families and children in Hadiach, Poltavaska oblast.
- On 21 June, a training on GBV was provided for UNHCR's operational NGO partners in Dnipro, Zaporizhzhia, Poltava, Kharkiv and Sumy, where participants discussed gender and GBV risk analysis, mainstreaming and referral pathways. Training sessions on child protection were also provided for UNHCR's NGO partners NEEKA and Nehemia in Uzhhorod.

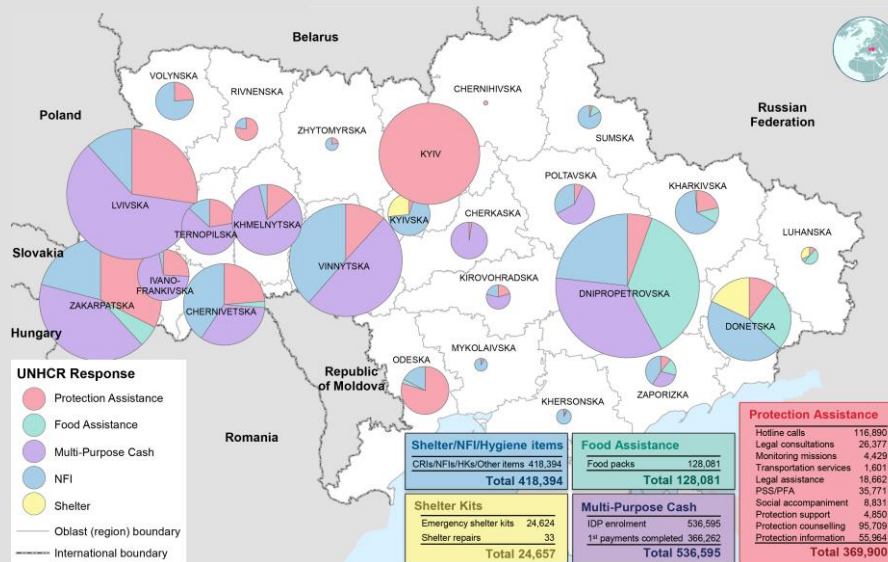

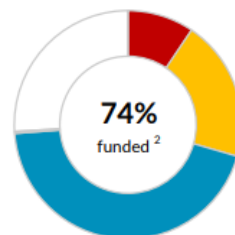
