UNHCR CCCM Cluster IDP Collective Sites Mapping here As the war in Ukraine passed its 100th day and 20 per cent of the country's territory is under temporary occupation according to the Ukrainian authorities, fierce fighting continues in eastern Ukraine. Airstrikes and missile attacks continue to be reported in multiple oblasts, including in Kyiv, endangering people's lives and driving humanitarian needs. At the same time, people affected, including those displaced, are starting to seek medium to longerterm solutions to their precarious situations.

UNHCR has continued to expand the scale and reach of programmes, with the aim of delivering assistance and services as close as possible to the place where people are sheltering or have been displaced. UNHCR's response has now reached more than 1.3 million people with protection services, assistance through cash or essential items, and shelter support to repair or protect their damaged homes from the elements.

UNHCR operates as part of the inter-agency emergency response and is leading three clusters - Protection, Shelter and NFIs (nonfood items), and CCCM (Camp Coordination and Camp Management.

While providing immediate relief to those fleeing, UNHCR is also working closely with local and national actors to lay the groundwork for sustainable and durable solutions and ensure that our response is aligned with social programmes thus effectively reinforcing and complementing national systems.

The longer the war continues, the **medium to longer-term needs** that conflict-affected people, IDPs, and returnees will face to rebuild their lives will similarly rise and require sustained support from the humanitarian and broader international community.

KEY RESPONSE FIGURES

A total of 1.3 M people reached with assistance to date.

263,150 people received targeted protection assistance and information at border points, transit, and reception centres and through hotlines.

516,251 individuals enrolled to receive cash assistance and 166,630 individuals received their

WEEKLY HIGHLIGHTS

- From 30 May to 3 June, UNHCR Representative in Ukraine, Karolina Lindholm Billing, visited Poltava, Dnipro, Zaporizhzhia, Vinnytsia as well as Kalynivka and Koziatyn in Vinnytska oblast where she met with local authorities, NGOs and IDPs themselves to listen to their needs and concerns and discussed continued cooperation to address the protection and housing needs of people impacted by the war.
- On 1 June, Children's Day in Ukraine, UNHCR and its NGO partners organized events and recreational
 activities, such as art classes, face painting, karaoke singing and bubble shows for IDP children in Chernivtsi,
 Lviv and Uzhhorod. UNHCR's NGO partners also raised awareness on issues relating to child protection and
 provided consultation to individuals. For example, Proliska held group and individual psychological counselling
 with 40 adults and 92 children in Kharkiv.
- Since 24 February, UNHCR's NGO partners have provided psychosocial support to almost 25,000 people.
 Among the concerns raised are emotional disorders, aggression, sadness, psychosomatic manifestations, eating and sleeping disorders.
- Since the beginning of the emergency, UNHCR and its NGO partners have provided legal consultations to more
 than 15,000 people, legal assistance to more than 12,000 people, social accompaniment to nearly 7,000 people
 and protection counselling and information to more than 105,000 people. The concerns most often raised by
 the individuals counselled related to medical care, social services, employment issues and finding
 accommodation.
- UNHCR continues to make all efforts to deliver assistance through humanitarian convoys, both UNHCR and interagency, to the hardest-hit areas of the country. Since 24 February 2022, UNHCR has delivered items to 47 locations in 13 oblasts through 68 convoys.
