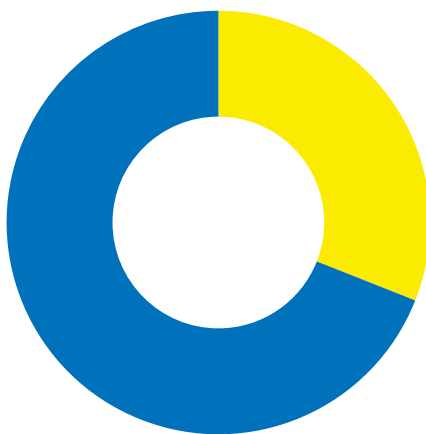

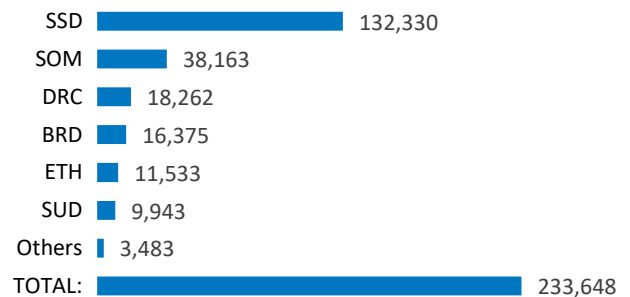

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PROTECTION

Achievements and Impact

- UNHCR CP reviewed 70 Best Interest Assessments reports during the month. 3 Case conference meetings were held to deliberate on complex cases.
- 3 Interagency Best Interest Determination Panel meetings were conducted during the month where a total of 32 cases, mainly for children under consideration for resettlement, were discussed
- 211(119Boys, and 92Girls) children at the reception center were reached through awareness messages on Child Protection, referral pathways and services, toll-free numbers, and parenting without violence.
- 174(125Boys, 49Girls) were engaged in Play and Art therapy. The children could learn positive ways of expressing their emotions, enhance their creativity, alleviate their anxieties and relieve them from distress.
- 3569(1932M, 1637F) children engaged in different age-appropriate activities across the CFS in Kalobeyei and Kakuma Camp.
- 700(350M, 350F) refugee and local children participated in the child-led Day of African child (DAC) celebration.
- 856 women participated in prevention activities in June, including gender clubs block, neighborhood forums, GBV training, couple's module, and mass awareness
- 150 men participated in this month's Engaging Men through Accountable Practices (EMAP) meetings, and 491 participated in GBV prevention activities.
- A total of 1091 (814F, 277M) persons were reached in the targeted block and neighborhood forums in Kakuma and Kalobeyei.
- 2486(1523m, 963f) youth engaged in sports and creative arts, including chess games, basketball, and football, in both the host community and the refugee camp during the month.
- 23 (18 male and 5 Female) youths were enrolled in the digital literacy classes
- 360 female adolescents and youths were engaged during focus mentorship sessions.
- 55 households with 212 individuals were submitted in June 2022 against the US resettlement quotas. Also, one family of five people was sent to France in June 2022 under unallocated quotas.
- By the end of June 2022, UNHCR Kakuma will have sent in 224 cases involving 900 people.
- Six cases with 24 people went to Canada, one case with 4 people went to Norway, and nine cases with 15 people went to the United States. In total, 16 cases with 43 people left.
- UNHCR Kakuma has voluntarily repatriated 87 households with 374 individuals to Burundi in June 2022. Additionally, UNHCR Kakuma has voluntarily repatriated 1 household of 1 individual to the DRC in June 2022.
- 600 birth certificates were issued to Persons of Concerns at Kakuma and Kalobeyei.



EDUCATION

Achievements and Impact

- Over 90,000 learners enrolled in 55 schools in Kakuma and Kalobeyei sat for end-of-term one examination before schools closed on 30 June 2022.
- UNHCR's Education partner Humanity and Inclusion (HI) conducted Inclusive Early Childhood Development Education (IECDE) disability awareness creation session for 60 (38 female) caregivers of learners in ECDE centres in refugee-hosting areas to promote access to IECDE for learners with and without disabilities
- 116(46 female) Children with Disabilities (CWDs) were provided with individual support in 13 ECD centers, and 80 (35 female) were Supported through Home-based care and supplementary feeding.
- UNHCR and partners supported the enrolment of 147 (93 female) over-aged out-of-school children in the Accelerated Education centers in Kakuma and Kalobeyei.
- 649 (301 female) learners provided psychosocial support and mentorships through peer-to-peer club sessions
- Equation letters for 37 students with foreign certificates were submitted to Kenya National Examinations Council (KNEC) for national exam registration.
- Ninety-four newly enrolled girls at LifeWorks Boarding School are supported with a complete set of uniforms (2 pairs each) and other educational supplies to enhance quality learning.
- 37 (17 female) and 78 (30 female) Boards of Management trained on inclusive education in Kalobeyei
- 37 (12 female) club patrons trained on the inclusion of Psychosocial Support in learners' club activities. Additionally, the patrons were trained on PSEA, Code of Conduct, and CRM.



CASH BASED INTERVENTIONS (CBI)

Achievements and Impact

- 44,248 persons of concern from 7,579 families in Kalobeyei Settlement were supported with KES 12.87 million unrestricted cash to purchase soap and other hygiene items for two months (May and June 2022). Women of reproductive age (11-50 years) made up 28.9% (12,789) of the population and received cash for sanitary materials such as extra soap, sanitary pads, and panties.
- The same population (7,579 families of 44,248 individuals) received KES 3.74 million in unrestricted cash support to purchase energy for cooking.
- A total of 56,100.00 was disbursed to 87 families of 374 refugees and asylum seekers for their return to their country of origin, Burundi. The cash provided as a pre-departure package, at 150 USD per individual, to cover basic needs on arrival in the country of origin was distributed by Equity Bank Over the Counter at Kakuma airstrip, before boarding the aircraft.
- A CBI Post Distribution was conducted where 27 trained enumerators collected data based on the standard questionnaire. The areas covered included the objectives of CBI (access to hygiene materials, cooking energy, shelter construction, education), coping strategies and spending habits, accountability, and the quality of the distribution process.

- KES 22,000.00 cash for education scholarships was disbursed to 2 students under the M-Pesa Foundation Academy, through the students' virtual accounts. The cash was meant for transport allowance to return home during the school holiday and back to school for the second term of academic year 2022.
- Cumulatively, over USD 200,000 was distributed to POCs in Kalobeyei settlement and Kakuma camp for the objectives of access to hygiene items, cooking energy, education, and voluntary repatriation during the reporting period.



HEALTH

Achievements and Impact

- In June, 441 skilled deliveries were recorded within the various health facilities.
- A total of 705 mental health consultations were made in the month.
- There were 1,193 individuals on follow-up for various non-communicable diseases.
- 19 cases were referred from Kakuma to Lodwar, Eldoret, and Nairobi. These were mainly emergency cases needing specialized care not available in Kakuma and diagnostic imaging services such as CT scan to assist in managing various health conditions.
- Additionally, 169 cases were referred to Kakuma Mission Hospital for imaging services.
- Eight new cases of COVID-19 were reported in June 2022. Cumulatively, 1,317 COVID-19 positive cases have been identified from a sample size of 20,558.
- As of 26th June, 6,426 individuals were admitted to the two quarantine facilities in Kakuma and Kalobeyei.
- By the end of June, 23,780 out of a target of 96,539 PoCs, and 1,525 out of 3000 targeted humanitarian workers had been fully vaccinated. Additionally, 86 humanitarian workers and 884 PoCs had received the booster vaccine.



FOOD SECURITY AND NUTRITION

Achievements and Impact

- In June, 738 (712 refugees and 26 nationals) admissions to the Outpatient Therapeutical Program (OTP)
- One thousand six hundred sixty-six entries (1,555 refugees and 33 nationals) in the Supplementary Feeding Program (SFP) for children under five years were recorded.
- Thirty-three malnourished pregnant and lactating women were also admitted into the SFP program. There was a slight reduction in admissions in the outpatient clinics.
- The Stabilization Centre (SC) admitted 252 severely malnourished children with medical complications, of which 29 were nationals.

- Increased cases of acute watery diarrhea, referrals from the host community and outpatient clinics in the refugee camps due to effects of drought, and reduced food rations caused the surge in admissions.
- There were twelve deaths reported in the SC. Partners are working closely with the county Ministry of health for timely follow-up of referred cases from the host community for continuity of care to minimize the risk of death.
- Three health facilities are in the alert phase of the surge approach, and the stabilization center is in its emergency phase. Community sensitization was scaled up to improve hygiene and sanitation and prevent malnutrition at the community level.
- The performance indicators for children under five years with acute malnutrition remained within the recommended SPHERE standards, where the recovery rates are >75% for both OTP and SFP. 4.2% of children defaulted in OTP and 4.5 % from the SFP programme in Kalobeyei, mostly from the host community. 0.2% of children defaulted from SFP in Kakuma.
- Monthly nutrition distribution sessions reached 12,146 caregivers
- Promotion of optimal Maternal Infant and Young Child Nutrition (MIYCN) practices through 46 active support groups continued during the month.
- One hundred nineteen children were presented at the facilities as Family MUAC referrals. Of these children, 32 were enrolled in OTP, 72 in SFP, while 15 did not meet the admission criteria to the treatment programs.
- Five community dialogue sessions and five family bazaars were conducted to discuss optimal infant and young child feeding, reaching 200 caregivers in Kakuma.



ACCESS TO ENERGY & ENVIRONMENTAL CONSERVATION

Achievement and Impact

- Internal electrical wiring work was completed at Somali Bantu Secondary School. The solar system is sufficiently working to serve all the digital learning and printing needs of the school
- Trenching, laying cables and backfilling were completed in Kaapoka Hospital and reception centres.
- All feeder pillars for the external power distribution networks for the health facilities, field posts, and Reception Centers were delivered to Kakuma and installation work is ongoing.
- Solar panels for Phase one (15 Kakuma 1 Camp Schools) were delivered to Kakuma.
- Upscaling of the 60kWp solar minigrad to 541kWp at Kalobeyei Settlement (Renewvia Energy) was completed in June. The new system has the capacity to supply power to 3,000 HHs and SMEs.
- Two refugee leader's meetings were held in both Kakuma and Kalobeyei to discuss issues of energy and the environment. Low CBI transfer values for cooking energy, the threat of solid waste, and power distribution line coverage for the Kalobeyei Settlement minigrad were among the issues raised.

- External electrical works to connect the solar system to the facility building at Biashara/Huduma centre have commenced.
- 93 MT of firewood was received at the Firewood Centre 4.
- A total of 71MTs of firewood were distributed to learning institutions, hospitals, reception centres, new arrivals, child-headed households, and vulnerable families in Kakuma Camp and Kalobeyei settlement.
- 161 cookstoves were distributed to relocated PoCs, with 10 distributed to old caseloads.
- Cumulatively, 23,700 tree seedlings were produced and propagated in June in all the tree nurseries. 17,509 seedlings were distributed to Kakuma refugee camp, Kalobeyei settlement, the host community and to institutions.



SHELTER AND NFIS

Achievement and Impact

- During the reporting period, 70 transitional shelters were constructed for new arrivals. No improved Shelters were constructed for new arrivals with special needs. The cumulative shelter construction for this year is a total of 1,949 new T-shelters constructed. A total of 366 POCs (representing 72 HHs) benefited from the provision of T-shelters during the reporting period, while cumulatively this year, 6,475 individuals in 1,941 households have benefited from the provision of T-shelters.
- The construction of the 32 permanent ISSB shelters in the Ex-Dadaab transit center is still ongoing, with the interlocking blocks in various stages of roofing and finishing.
- Five cases of shelter repair were resolved during the reporting period. A total of 17 shelter cases have been resolved since January.
- The expansion of Kalobeyei Reception Center with the construction of 21 additional communal shelters is completed.
- Preparations were being made to pitch additional family tents at Kalobeyei reception center. Cumulatively in 2022, 100 family tents have so far been pitched at Kalobeyei Reception.
- Construction of 2 bus stations in Kalobeyei is in progress.
- Renovation work targeting 3 secondary schools for the host community is in progress. The schools include our Ladies' secondary, Kalobeyei, and Tarach mixed secondary school.
- Completion and additional work in the Biashara/Huduma center have begun.
- 70 plots were demarcated during the reporting period bringing the total number of plots demarcated in 2022 to 1,619 family plots.



WATER AND SANITATION

Achievement and Impact

- The 2022 Q1 WASH Thematic Working Group Meeting was held at the UNHCR conference room on June 30, 2022.
- 7 tap stands are constructed in Kakuma and Kalobeyei reception centres.
- As part of climate proofing intervention, rehabilitation of a borehole-apron has been carried out to prevent the borehole from erosion, which can be caused by surface water runoffs.
- In Kakuma, some 7,290 households were reached with hygiene promotion messages including latrine construction and maintenance, handwashing with soap, food and water hygiene and solid waste management at the household level.
- With material support from PWJ, 81 households in Kakuma camp completed construction of family latrines.
- In addition, 199 households are supported with poles for household latrine construction and 65 family shared latrines are constructed for people with specific needs in Kakuma.
- Newly arrived PoCs at the reception centres received awareness messages on handwashing with soap, food and water hygiene, proper latrine usage and solid waste management.
- In Kakuma reception centre, construction of 2 blocks (10 stances) of permanent latrines is on going. The expected completion date is July 31, 2022. The current ratio of people per latrine at the reception centre is 1:90, which does not meet the minimum standard of 1:50. The ongoing latrine construction is aimed at improving latrine coverage.
- In Kalobeyei RC, there are 63 functional latrines stances (28 permanent, 35 temporary). The ratio of people per latrine stance is close to 1:5. PWJ is in the procurement process of constructing 60 stances of permanent latrines in Kalobeyei RC.



COMMUNITY EMPOWERMENT AND SELF RELIANCE

Achievement and Impact

- 18 refugees and 16 host youth are undertaking professional courses including Certified Public Accountants (CPA), Certificate in Accounting and Management Skills (CAMS), and a Diploma in Accounting Technicians (ATD), as well as Kenya's Board of Accountants and Secretaries Examiners (KNEC)
- 145 students have been registered for the *National Industrial Training Authority (NITA)* Grade 2 Examinations and KNEC due in August 2022 as follows: (128M:17F) (133R:12H)

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
