Conflict in the North-East of Nigeria has escalated in recent months with more than 1.2 million internally displaced persons (IDP) in need of humanitarian assistance as of 4 March 2015, as registered by the National Emergency Management Agency (NEMA). In addition, some 194,000¹ refugees, returnees and stranded migrants have fled to neighboring countries to seek safety from the violence and inter-communal violence in North-Central Nigeria continues to have a humanitarian impact



Estimated internally displaced people by conflict and inter-communal violence as of 04 March 2015




People fled to neighbouring countries including refugees, returnees and stranded migrants as 10 March 2015




ACTORS RESPONDING
