# **Congo**: Refugees from the Democratic Republic of the Congo (Mar 2010)



Since October 2009, some 114,000 refugees have fled armed clashes in Equateur Province in the Democratic Republic of the Congo (DRC) and found refuge in the Congo.'

# Background

The Equateur Province has experienced sporadic inter-ethnic violence over the past several decades, generated by tensions over limited resources, circulation of small arms and weak Government presence.<sup>1</sup>

## 2 Recent clashes

March 2009: Armed clashes arose from disputes over farming and fishing rights in Sud-Ubangi district.

Oct 2009: Fighting displaced people to other parts of Equateur, with an influx of refugees in Central African Republic and the Congo. At least 270 civilians killed in Dongo.


Nov 2009: Civil unrest spread to a wider area in Equateur.

Dec 2009: The Armed Forces of the DRC (FARDC) intervened to re-establish Government control over the region, supported by the UN Peacekeeping Force.

Jan 2010 - now: The refugee caseload has stabilized.1


# B Refugees in the Congo

Terrified by the violence, refugees from DRC crossed the Oubangui river and settled in more than 100 sites along the border in Congo.

### Logistics 🔜

The relief operation is logistically complex and expensive; the majority of sites can be reached only by plane or boat.

Many boats are in 4 disrepair and fuel is scarce and costly. Due to low water levels during the dry season, the river is only suitable for small craft.<sup>1</sup>

The road between Bétou and Impfondo is in poor condition and usable only during part of the dry season.1
