As a result of the ongoing clashes, May 2015 witnessed

two major military displacements in Idleb governorate.

An estimated 147,391 people fled Idleb city and its

surrounding, a further 41,830 were displaced from Jisr

Members of the CCCM cluster (which included local and international NGOs and other humanitarian

stakeholders) used an agreed system to collect, modify and verify the data on displacement. During the initial

phase of Idleb displacement reports were compiled and disseminated multiple times per week. This real-time gathering data and analysis guided the humanitarian actors to areas and numbers of IDPs,

geographical gaps where no assessments had been conducted (but where displacement was likely), locations where IDP numbers were increasing (particularly urban centers), and general trends within the displacement. These lists of affected communities and heat maps became critical resource for all clusters to

realign their response with the needs of the IDPs.

The information allowed humanitarian actors to shift pre-positioned resources away from areas in the Salqin and Harim sub-districts to areas of more critical need (Saragab, Sarmin, rural areas around Idleb city).

CCCM members continued to provide regular support

to the 211,902 people living in camps and collective

centers. Members were able to provide the majority of

these IDPs with live saving NFIs, WASH services and food. However, significant gaps remain in the

provision of Health & Education to IDPs residing in

al Shugur.
