Iragi Security Forces launched an offensive on 14 August in Khazir in Ninewa Governorate, 40 km west of Erbil City, retaking several villages. Authorities transported over 300 IDPs (50 families) to Debaga Camp and have begun clearing the area of explosive hazards.


Over 4,000 IDPs have arrived in Debaga since the beginning of August. The sponsorship programme remains halted, limiting the means to decongest the overcrowding and mitigate the impact of the continuing influx into the camp.

ANBAR CORRIDOR

Between 11 and 13 August, over 3,000 persons were displaced to Al Khalidiya Camp as a result of ongoing fighting in Jazeerat Al Khalidiya, Jazeerat Al Ramadi Island, and Jazeerat Al Therthar.

On 13 and 14 August, armed groups launched attacks on Ramadi reportedly causing property damage but no casualties. This follows similar attacks on Heet a week earlier that killed ten people and injured a further seven. Local authorities have requested more troops in order to protect returnees in retaken areas.

Insecure conditions in Haji Ali

- Iraqi Security Forces have reportedly retaken villages around Al Qayyarah, and parts of the city. Some 1,000 IDPs who fled from Al Qayyarah have found temporary shelter in three schools in Hasiyah in Haji Ali. The conditions there are overcrowded with urgent health and WASH needs.
- A recent security assessment and interagency mission found that the area remains in range of indirect fire and is contaminated with explosive hazards. Humanitarian actors are working on the modalities for interventions.
- Nonetheless, some displaced families are opting to stay there while others are moving onward to Debaga in order to reunite with family members.
- UNHCR continues to advocate for safe passage of civilians fleeing hostilities in Ninewa Governorate and for authorities to make available more land and public buildings to shelter IDPs in areas away from the frontline.

Iraqi refugee returns

- Authorities allowed 41 Iraqi refugees to cross from Syria into the Kurdistan Region of Iraq and transit to Salah al-Din. Originally from the Ninewa, Salah al-Din and Diyala Governorates, most had fled into Syria between April and May, and found shelter in Al Hol Camp. They later became stranded for several weeks at the Rabi'a border point trying to return to Iraq.
- The authorities are preparing to allow over 150 more Iraqi refugees through the border point in the coming days.

Berm around Rutba

ANBAR CORRIDOR

Local authorities in Rutba stated on 14 August that work had begun on a
defensive berm to protect the city and support the sustainability of returns
following a series of attacks by armed groups in recent weeks.

Relocation of IDPs in Baghdad

The Baghdad Provincial Council has announced plans to reclaim schools as of 1 September that are being used as collective centres to shelter IDPs from Anbar, and find alternative locations for IDPs unable to return. The Council also specified that IDPs from Al Karmah, northeast of Falluja, living in unfinished buildings and camps in Baghdad should return to their areas of origin by the beginning of September. UNHCR has expressed concerns over further disruptions to the lives of IDPs, and continues to stress the importance of ensuring any returns are voluntary and conducted in a safe, dignified and non-discriminatory manner.

Route opens for returns to Anbar

 Authorities have cleared the highway linking Baghdad, Falluja and Ramadi of explosive hazards and reopened it for civilian traffic on 14 August. This now gives returnees another option other than through Bzeibiz.
